CAMPAIGN GRAND TOTAL NOW \$128,973

Minute Hand of Campaign Clock Passes Halfway Point.

With the first half of the Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign passed, and 1676 subscriptions reported to date, the great corps of volunteer workers last night, Wednesday, in the Social Hall of Trinity United Church, carried their grand total to \$128,973. The evening marks the second sag of the campaign, for the amount garnered in the 24 hours closing with the sixth rally supper was only \$5,335.75. There almost always are two slumps in a campaign with such a large objective as \$250,000, so the volunteers now are breathing freely because they feel that the worst has happened. It is the general conviction that from now on the whole trend of the movement will be upward. The minute hand of the campaign clock has passed the halfway point on the dial and is moving upward instead of downward. Besides all the workers have their second wind.

Much now depends on the Memorial Committee and the Provincial District Committees, said Executive Chairman W. F. Tidmarsh in campaign headquarters, 136 Richmond St. last night. Mr. Tidmarsh has been referred to as "the Grand Young Man of the Campaign, the man who took the pain out of campaign." Although he is a veteran of many civic movements, and has dwelt in Prince Edward Island for forty years, he is as vigorous a leader as ever and shows as much freshness of enthusiasm as if he were his own grandson.

"I look to Memorial Chairman, W. F. Rogers, and the 23 other Elder Statesmen of the Memorial Committee," Executive Chairman Tidmarsh continued, "to bring in another goodly number of generous subscriptions in the next few days. And I look to Mr. H. Hooper Horne, Chairman of the Allied Towns Committee, to inspire his 46 District Chairmen throughout Kings and Queens Counties to roll up a total of

at least \$60,000 for the Province outside of Charlottetown. With such achievements on the part of those two major groups, Victory will perch upon our banners and crow us triumphantly as any chancier. We are like the Pears Soap boy in the bathtub—we won't be happy till we get it."

Mrs. Andrew McFair, the speaker of the evening, evoked great applause by her witty and inspiring address. At the earnest invitation of the Executive Committee, Mr. Charles M. Williams, of Williams and Bentley, who is a prominent member of the crack Team No. 2, captained by Walter S. Grant, will leave Charlottetown on the 2 o'clock train Saturday afternoon for a flying trip to Toronto, Waterloo Ottawa and Montreal as special ambassador to certain large interests in those cities which have a big stake in the welfare of Prince Edward Island. Ambassador Williams is in conference with Memorial Chairman Rogers; Mr. Wallace L. Higgins, Chairman of the Business Friends Committee, and Dr. J. A. Clark, Chairman of the Committee on Former Residents, as well as with Executive Chairman Tidmarsh and Commander Charles H. Black of the Men's Division, and is busy blocking out his trip. He will see distinguished individuals as well as corporations in the interest of the Hospital. Mr. Williams was selected for this delicate and vital mission by unanimous vote of the Executive Committee.

Mrs. Neil D. McLean's team No. 14, led the snare boys in the championship class at Rally No. 6 last night with 16 subscriptions totalling \$569. The Nurse's team, No. 19, captained by Mrs. W. E. Bentley, won the championship of the Women's Division with \$385 in 7 subscriptions. Captain E. H. Beer and his stalwarts of Team 4 turned in 5 contributions totalling \$445, thus becoming champions of the Men's Division.

The grand totals of Provincial District Committees to date follows: Bonshaw, \$525; Fredericton, \$229; Georgetown, \$348; Harrington, \$145; Hunter River, \$218; Kingsboro, \$123; Marshfield, \$445; Millview, \$126; Milton, \$200; Montague, \$437; Murray River, \$252; New Glasgow, \$616; Nine Mile Creek, \$132; Stanley Bridge, \$53; Victoria, \$245.
