Late in the afternoon the canoe upset and both were thrown into the water. Burns was caught as he came up and was pulled into a boat that came to the rescue. Wrayton never came to the surface. Neither of the boys could swim. Wrayton's mother died three weeks ago.

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FUNERAL OF LATE SENATOR FERGUSON

The funeral of the late Hon. Donald Ferguson took place yesterday afternoon from his residence at Marshfield in presence of a very large and representative gathering of friends, neighbors and public men from all parts of the Province. Among those present were His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice Sullivan, Senator Robertson, Hon. F. L. Hazzard, L. E. Prowse, M. P. Hon. A. B. Warburton, M. P. Hon. James Richards, M. P. Hon. J. H. Cumiskey, Hon. John Richards, John McLean, M. L. A. Hon. George E. Hughes, Alexander Martin, A. A. McLean, K. C. J. A. Mattison, M. L. A. W. S. Stewart, K. C. and many other public men.

There was a large delegation from the City to pay the last tribute of respect to an honored and honorable public man. The sons of the deceased had returned from abroad and were present. Impressive services were conducted at the house in which Rev. C. W. Corey, Baptist, Rev. Mr. Hawley, Rev. Mr. Green, Presbyterian, and Rev. Mr. Bell, Methodist, took part. Rev. Mr. Corey paid an eloquent tribute to the high character and long and able services of the deceased Senator.

After the services at the home the long procession formed and proceeded to the Baptist cemetery, where all that was mortal of a well-known and honored public man was laid to rest in the family plot in which his father and mother are buried. The religious services at the grave were conducted by Rev. C. W. Corey, G. D. Wright being the funeral director. The active pallbearers were, Henry Rowell, W. J. Gibson, John Hill, Robert McFarlane, Hans Vessey and Wm. Godfrey. The honorary pallbearers were Sir Louis Davies, S. W. Crable, Isaac Crosby, Abraham Brown, Donald Nicholson and Charles Lyons.
