Scout News and Notices

Honorary membership in the Peterborough Fish and Game Association has been accorded the Boy Scouts of that district.

The boys of the 128th Toronto Chinese Scout Troop are proud of the fact that five of their number have attained the rank of King's Scout.

Numbers of Boy Scout troops throughout Canada contributed substantially to the Ohio and Mississippi flood relief by organized collections of canned goods, clothing and money.

Because of his municipal duties, Mayor E. S. Wigle of Windsor, Ont., has been compelled to terminate his 27 years as District Commissioner of the Border Cities Boy Scouts Association.

Canada's several Scout troops of Indian boys have been added to the organization of groups at the Shingwauk Indian residential school at Sault Ste. Marie, and at Devon, N. B., near Fredericton.

Numbers of applications to camp next summer with English Boy Scouts are being received at London headquarters on the Continent.

London Boy Scouts have been assigned numerous tasks for the Coronation. They will help the police control crowds, act as messengers, and be on duty outside Westminster Abbey.

Mayor C. D. Sulman of Chatham, Ont., himself a former King's Scout, presented badges to present-generation Scouts following a Scout training demonstration before Chatham Rotary Club.

And now the Boy Scouts of Barrie, Ont., have been given a fine, wooded 100-acre camp site, on Georgian Bay. Members of the Kiwanis and Lion's Clubs and other prominent citizens were the donors.

That blind Scouts can usher as efficiently as those with their sight was the interesting demonstration given by the boys of the 1st Brantford Troop, of the Ontario School for the Blind, at a recent school concert.

Following the example of Holland, the Dutch East Indies are issuing a special postage stamp to commemorate the holding this summer of the 5th World Boy Scout Jamboree in the Netherlands.

Every normal boy wants to be a Scout. And my own admiration for this great youth movement and the value of its training is such that I am convinced that the whole duty of a father to his son has not been discharged until that boy has been encouraged to join the Boy Scout organization.

Professions Open To Chinese Women Customs Changing

CALGARY, March 15.—(CP)—Vivacious and friendly, Mrs. Lee Yuen, the former Miss Jessie Ho Lem, who was born and reared in Calgary, has returned home after two years residence in China where she was happy to find women in that country were finding more and more opportunities in the modern world.

"I felt at home there and would have stayed, and yet it was good to get back here, too," she said. With her artist husband she went to China with the intention of remaining, but the climate was not suitable to Mr. Yuen's health.

They returned laden with beautiful teakwood and camphorwood handcarved furniture which is being fitted into their new home. Mr. Yuen made good use of his visit to his native land, and many of the pictures in the home are from his able brush.

There was evidence of the "new" China. Bound feet and quaint hair styles were never seen at the coast, at least, and Chinese women had not been binding their feet for 40 or 50 years.

Chinese girls were finding more opportunities to develop and express their talents and personalities. Many women were taking positions as college presidents, doctors, lawyers and in places of responsibility in the business world.

Women were interested in clothes, too, but they seemed to have settled on one becoming compromise between the east and west and to have adopted this with only slight variations, almost exclusively. Mrs. Yuen had several of these dresses, all with high collars and simulating the Chinese gown of former years in simplicity.

They are usually open down one side and buttoned with silk braided buttons and loops to form attractive trimmings. Sleeves are long or short as desired.

The project was organized by Rev. and Mrs. J. T. Stephens. Each woman or girl is paid in credit for actual time worked. They credit each woman with 40 cents for an afternoon and proportionately for whatever time she puts in.

Calling themselves "The Busy Bees," 200 women busy themselves plying needles in a "factory" here repairing old clothing and household materials under the "Goodwill Industries" plan.
