which took so much out of him after his recent illness. Major Aubrey's opinion is a real pacer and will get a very low record before this season is over.

First Heat—After four or five scores they got away fairly well, except Bingen Aubrey who was back about two lengths. Bud Axworthy on the outside hooked up for a duel of speed with Major Aubrey and the way they tore to the quarter was terrific, thirty-one seconds being registered on the timers dials. Something had to break with that pace and Bud Axworthy was the one to do it. Major Aubrey continued serenely to the half in 1:04, his opposition far in the rear. At the half Marge Direct was in second position but back about twenty yards. Marge not seeing anything around her probably, decided that the race was over, anyhow she made a standstill break and Aubriana, coming fast had great difficulty to avoid smashing into her. Bingen Aubrey still farther in the rear almost collided with the pair, but she was saved by a narrow escape on ground on Major Aubrey. The Major was being taken back when he struck the home stretch and finished under restraint six lengths to the good in time that may consist of a record for St. Peters Bay race track for many years to come. 2:14 1-4.

Racing was according to rule at St. Peters yesterday and the rules provided that a distance flag must be set up. Unfortunately this got lost and the pace, namely, Marge Direct and Bud Axworthy, through the disastrous races referred to. Second Heat, Sir John McDonald was a clever man and said many clever things, but one saying that he would persist as long as sport lives in that "election of horse races are the two most uncertain things on earth." Sir John was verified yesterday in the second heat of the 2:24 pace. Probably not one person in the vast concourse of 3500 who witnessed the first heat, has been known to trot miles in 2:16. Sharpburg won a large number of races last year in the U. S. A., and the Banker who looked better than we have seen him for years has trotted Charlottetown track in 2:17.

As mentioned before the racing finished about five o'clock which could only be possible under the three heat plan.
