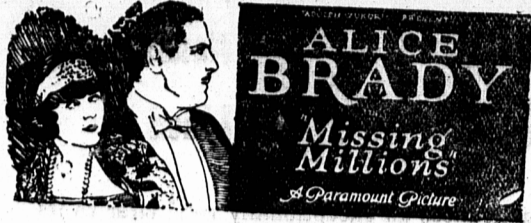

BELL GOVT.'S HUGE DEFICITS

At Dec. 31, 1918, Mr. A. W. Hyndman, Manager of the Royal Bank, and External Auditor for the Government, reported the net debt of the province to be \$1,006,991.71
At Sept. 8, 1919, Messrs. J. J. Hughes, M.P., and Mr. Hyndman, External Auditors showed the net debt to be \$1,193,829.77
An increase of \$186,838.06
At Sept. 8, 1919, Mr. John Anderson, Provincial Auditor, showed the excess of expenditure over receipts, less unearned subsidy, to be \$253,938.78
An excess difference of \$67,100.72

WHICH IS CORRECT?

These are two alleged audits in the interests of the Bell Government to the same date, showing a difference of \$67,100.72—both cannot be correct. Which does the Bell Government accept—is it going to turn down Mr. Hughes and Mr. Hyndman? If so, why?

ANOTHER REPORT

gain, the Provincial Auditor, at the request of the Public Accounts Committee of the session of 1920, submitted an official statement of the position of the province at Dec. 31, 1919, which took the place of the External Audit, showing the Public Debt at that date to be \$1,121,437.23
An increase over 1919 (the first year reported on by the Bell Government) of \$114,405.52
An increase over 1911 (the last year of the previous Liberal Govt.) of \$113,174.30
NOTE:—The Conservative Government erected 31 permanent bridges at a cost of \$116,366.80, besides purchasing two agricultural buildings in Charlottetown and Summerside respectively, and installing a complete new heating and lighting system in the Provincial Building.

THE BELL GOVERNMENT ENORMOUS DEFICIT

AGAIN— At Sept. 8, 1919, Mr. J. J. Hughes, M.P. and Mr. A. W. Hyndman, Bell Govt. External Auditors showed the Liabilities to be \$1,193,829.77
At Dec. 31, 1922, the Bell Government Provincial Audit, shows the Liabilities to be \$1,397,060.78
An increase of Public Debt of \$203,231.01 And they have nothing to show for it but ordinary roads.
According to these, their own official figures, THE BELL GOVERNMENT HAS GONE BEHIND \$50,800 PER ANNUM,—yet their excuse for increased taxes is to "pay as they go," and they claim to have surpluses!

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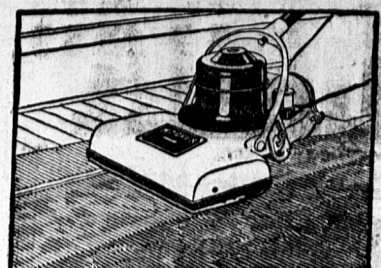

MAGNESIAN LIMESTONE IN AGRICULTURE

1918, it is stated: "So far as can be gathered, lime from magnesiam limestone appears to answer satisfactorily on heavy soils but is liable to cause trouble on light soils." Within the past few years a considerable amount of evidence has accumulated in the United States to show that limestones, high in magnesium carbonate can be used on clay and silt loams without apparent depression of crop yields or apparent injury to the soil—at least during the period of the experiment. Falling back on these results certain agricultural chemists in the United States have expressed the opinion that the presence of magnesia in either burnt lime or large limestone—no matter how large the percentage—cannot injuriously affect vegetation. The evidence at hand scarcely supports such a sweeping conclusion. The fact that soluble magnesiam compounds are toxic to vegetation and even in moderately small amounts when in excess of calcium compounds depress crop yields, has been the chief reason for the warning that there was a danger in using the magnesiam limestone. The argument of the advocates of magnesiam limestone, is that there are no soluble magnesiam compounds formed in the soil—and therefore that no injury results. It is to be admitted that there is fairly satisfactory evidence of the safe and successful employment of magnesiam limestone on clay and silt loams, but at the same time there is an abundance of evidence to show that the use of a high calcium limestone is preferable for Knitters.
