YOU CAN PLAN A LOT OF GOOD THINGS TO EAT WITH CATELLI'S MACARONI.

Try these tested Recipes:

VERMICELLI SOUP
Put a quart of clear broth into a stewpan on the fire; when boiling, add a cup of CATELLI'S VERMICELLI, boil gently 20 minutes and serve.

MACARONI CROQUETTES
Break 1/2 package of CATELLI'S MACARONI into half inch pieces and prepare by boiling. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a saucepan, stir in three tablespoons flour, add 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 teaspoonful paprika, breadcrumbs, one cup milk, cream, or tomato puree and stir until the sauce boils, add macaroni and three tablespoons cheese, grated, 1 teaspoonful chopped parsley, then mix and turn out on a buttered plate to cool. When cold take up in tablespoons and form into cylinder shapes. Dip in one beaten egg, roll in grated cheese and then in breadcrumbs, and fry one minute in smoking hot fat. Serve with or without tomato sauce.

VERMICELLI PUDDING
Put 1/2 package CATELLI'S VERMICELLI into a pint of boiling milk, add a pinch of salt, boil 20 minutes; cool off and add 1 or 2 eggs well beaten, a little lemon peel and sugar. Put into a pudding basin slightly buttered, cover the top with a piece of buttered paper and steam for 1/2 an hour.
