**DR. BELAND'S HAIR HAS WHITENED.**

NEW BEDFORD, Mass.—Dr. Henry S. Beland, former postmaster general of Canada, who was captured in Belgium when the Germans invaded that country, still believes that there is an organized campaign in Canada to rescue him, according to a letter received here tonight.

The letter was from a French Canadian officer who met an Englishman who had been released from the prison camp where Dr. Beland was confined. He said the former Canadian postmaster general had nearly lost his reason when his wife died sometime after their imprisonment, but he had shown rare courage and had never given up hope of regaining his freedom. The Englishman said that Dr. Beland's hair had turned white during his confinement, as had been reported, but that his face was drawn and he weighs only 140 pounds. It is said that much longer confinement would place Dr. Beland's life in jeopardy.

France, July 24th, 1917.

My Dear Mother,—

I now take much pleasure in writing you those few lines to let you know that I am still amongst the living and enjoying good health. I hope and sincerely wish that this may find you and all at home well and happy. We are having lovely weather over here and my Battalion is out for a few days rest at present and when I look over the green fields here in France, it makes me think of God's own country, Canada. However I am glad to know that the loved ones at home are enjoying peace and will as long as Great Britain rules the seas.

Well Dear Mother what I am going to say now, is something I don't care to speak of for I know such news won't help to comfort you any, for the time being anyway, but my wish is this, that any news you receive about me, no difference what it may be, is that you will look at things in the right light, and feel as I do about things and if it is God's will to call me away, why then His will be done, and if such be the case I haven't done any more for my country then I ought to have done. Don't take anything serious and forgive me for speaking about such, but I felt as it was my duty to do so.

I had a letter from brother Bob the other day, he an dall the rest of the family were well at time of writing. I will write you another letter in near future if spared. I received Pa's letter some few days ago and tell him to enjoy life while he can and to take that trip to Boston. **ABNORMAL TAX IS JUSTIFIABLE**

Income Levy Not in Lieu of Profits Tax, Sir Thomas White Explains.

**FURTHER ACTION IN NEXT BUDGET**

OTTAWA—The Government's income tax bill, which taxes incomes of unmarried men above \$1,500 and incomes of married men in excess of \$3,000, received its third reading in the House of Commons yesterday, and requires only the Senate's sanction and the Governor General's signature before it becomes law.

The Opposition sought to have the bill amended to increase the tax on incomes over \$6,000 and an amendment to that effect was moved by Mr. F. F. Pardo and seconded by Mr. Duncan Ross. This amendment was vigorously debated until after the six o'clock recess, when Speaker Rhodes ruled that it was out of order, quoting in defence of his decision the rule which does not permit an amendment being moved proposing the levying of a tax upon the people by anyone but a Minister with the approval of the Crown. The amendment, although thus disposed of, called forth a very interesting debate, the most noteworthy feature being reaffirmation by the Finance Minister in the most emphatic terms that the income tax was not introduced in lieu of the business profits war tax.

**Statement is Clear**

Sir Thomas White's statement on this point was as follows: "The business profits war tax by its terms comes to an end on December 31 of this year. When that measure was introduced it was thought the war would be at an end by that time. I stated the other day that we should tax abnormal business profits resulting from the war and in the next budget we shall deal with the matter."

Mr. Pardee: "Will there be a renewal?"

Sir Thomas White: "I have stated that next year taxation will be imposed on excess business profits. I stated also the other day that it might be necessary to make some allowance for necessary plant extensions, but I laid down the principle as strongly as I could that abnormal business profits due to the war must be abnormally taxed."

Continuing the debate at night in the House on the war taxation measure, Mr. Murphy quoted the opinion of O. K. Kuhn, an American financial authority, to the effect that the Canadian war taxes were moderate, the income tax being less than one-half the amount fixed by the United States House of Representatives.

Sir Thomas White interrupted to say that the Canadian Business tax is much heavier than that of the United States. He repeated a statement made in the afternoon that excess profits would be dealt with in the budget of next session.

"My honorable friend expects to be here for the next budget?" queried Mr. Murphy. "I do," Sir Thomas replied.

"Well, my honorable friend is very much in that opinion" asserted the member for Russell.

Mr. Duncan Ross of East Middlesex said that the income tax was all right as far as it went, but after all it was a very meagre form of tax. It was recognized that the smaller the income the greater the sacrifice of the man who pays this tax, he said, would not be satisfactory to the people because it does not provide for sufficient sacrifice on the part of the rich.

Sir Herbert Ames had stated that he had heard millionaires say that they did not desire to be richer after the war than before. He considered that a very low ideal of patriotic duty. Every man in Canada, rich or poor, should be willing to be poorer. The people do not want professions, but they do want acts, from the wealthy men of the country.

Sir Robert Borden said it was quite clear that Mr. Ross did not have a clear idea about the business tax. The tax for the present year would not be collected until 1918 and there would be ample opportunity at the next session of the House to take action in regard to the profits made during 1918.

Mr. Ross said that if the Prime Minister would state that in the event of his still being Prime Minister the tax would be extended he would be satisfied.

"You have no faith in your own party," remarked Hon. J. D. Hazen.

**Premier Replies**  
Sir Robert went on to say that no opposition member had raised a protest at the time limitations placed

upon the business tax when it was first introduced. This year the tax had been largely increased. He read Sir Thomas White's assurance, given in the afternoon, that excess profits made in 1918 would be dealt with. Mr. Ross should, therefore, be in a quite happy state of mind.

Referring to Mr. Murphy's references to the income and business tax, the Prime Minister said that it is true the new income tax introduced in the United States Congress was heavier than the Canadian tax, although the original tax was lower. He intimated that the tax could be increased at a future session. The Minister in imposing this tax, had to take into consideration the fact that it was retroactive for a portion of the present year. He also had to consider the generous contributions which have been made to the Patriotic Fund. In regard to the business tax he agreed with the Minister of Finance in stating that it was higher than the United States tax. As a matter of fact, he said, it was higher than any excess profits tax imposed by any other country in the world.

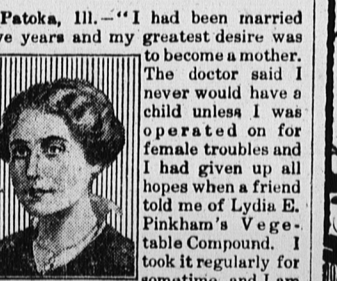
The bill was given its third reading.
