Those Most Guilty may Escape - Revolutionists Successful in Uncle Sam's Canal Game.

TRIAL OF JEW MURDERERS.

LONDON, Nov. 4 - (Special) - The correspondent of The Times in Russia says arrangements for the trial of those alleged to be involved in the massacre of Jews at Kisheneff have been made, but the selection of judges and court officials shows that the trial will be a mere mockery, especially as the defendants will be a handful of poor workmen and vagabonds and not those against whom considerable incriminating evidence could be produced.

THE PANAMA REVOLUTION.

PANAMA, Nov. 4 - (Special) - The revolution is making headway. The revolutionists have seized the Columbian Governor, the principal government officials, two generals and all the Columbian cruisers on the Pacific coast.

BIG DEMAND FOR TURKEYS.

Ottawa, Nov. 2 - The department of agriculture has received a letter from Lord Strathcona, Canadian high commissioner, which states that there is in Great Britain a great demand for Canadian turkeys for Christmas. On the London market very high prices may be obtained.

A similar letter is also addressed to the department of trade and commerce. Unfortunately this year both departments have to send the reply that there are no turkeys to fill the demand. They are a scarce and expensive article on the Canadian market.

ALVERSTONE SIDED WITH CANADA ONCE

But Two Days Before the Alaska Award was Made Public He Changed His Mind, and Favored American Contention, So Said Mr. Aylesworth at a Toronto Banquet.

TORONTO, Nov. 2 - A banquet tendered to A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., one of the Alaska commissioners, by the Canadian Club at the King Edward to-night, was a splendid tribute to his sturdy Canadianism.

The chair was occupied by Col. Bruce McDonald, president of the club. Canadian flags decorated the room, and, contrary to the announcement there was one lone British flag.

Mr. Aylesworth received a most enthusiastic welcome back to Canada. The toast to the King was accompanied by the National Anthem, after which The Maple Leaf Forever was sung most heartily.

The seating capacity of the hall was 350, and several score more were unable to enter, and stood around the door to listen.

Mr. Aylesworth's speech, which lasted over an hour, was a very careful review of the decision arrived at by the tribunal along lines laid down by himself and Sir Louis Jetté in dissenting judgment, but he evidently spoke throughout under considerable restraint.

The whole address was apparently calculated to soothe some of the feelings of resentment which has arisen.

He repeated, however, that the three British commissioners had first agreed with the Canadian contention with regard to the four islands in Portland Canal was unanswerable and that the Canadian commissioners did not know until Saturday before the decision was given that their colleague had changed his mind. In giving two of those islands to the United States the commissioners divided property in dispute instead of acting judicially.

In this connection he held Vancouver's narrative meant that all four islands should belong to either one of the parties. He paid a high tribute to the ability of Sir Louis Jetté and to the loyalty of the people of Canada.

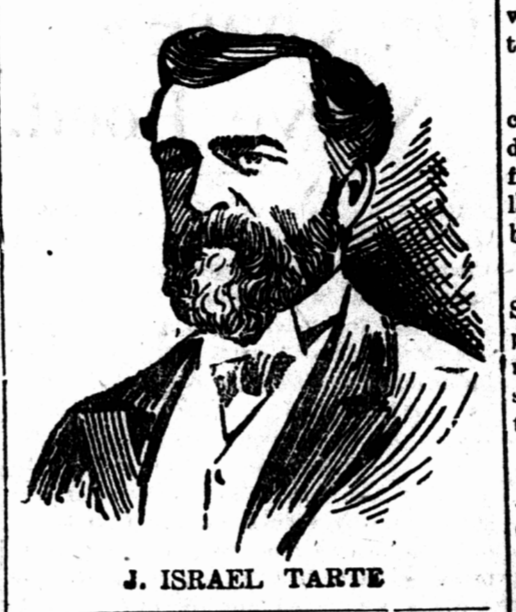
A CONFLICT IS INEVITABLE

Russian Government Does Not Expect War With Japan Before Next Spring.

LONDON, November 2 - Cabling from Che Foo, the correspondent of the Morning Post says the majority of Russian warships in Chinese waters are at Tientsin and Hayangtao. Three Chinese cruisers left Che Foo yesterday, the correspondent goes on, for the mouth of the Yalu river. This constitutes infringement of Korean rights.

The St Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail says he learns that the Russian government does not expect war with Japan in any event before next spring, even should the negotiations fail.

The correspondent at Shanghai of the Daily Telegraph says he has learned from a reliable source in Tokio that although the negotiations between Russia and Japan continue, Japan is inflexible, and a conflict sooner or later is regarded as inevitable.

She is owned by the captain and others, and was launched on October 23. As an instance of how quickly they can get away from Lunenburg it is only necessary to say that although nothing was ready at the time of the launch she was able to get away on her first trip on the 30th. Her length is 77 feet; breadth, 25 feet; depth, 10 feet; gross tonnage 123 and net tonnage 90.4. Her frame is of pine and spruce and planking of beech, all galvanised fastened. The spars are of Oregon pine. She was designed and built by Smith & Roland, the firm who designed the Baloom sealers. Her first voyage is to Alberton, P. E. I., to load oats for Trinidad. - Halifax Herald.
