LOBSTER FISHING

Sir,—I read with much interest the paragraph in the Western news column of your paper, dated June 21st, advocating fall lobster fishing.

We are sometimes, owing to ice conditions, unable to set lines until as late as the 21st of May, leaving only a short time to work in. The weather is colder and stormier than during August and September.

The majority, not only of fishermen, but packers, are also interested in farming; cropping must be attended to in spring, and it is almost impossible to obtain help at present.

If a fall season were granted, bait could be procured by the fishermen instead of having to buy from schooners at exorbitant prices.

The cod and hake fishing would be about over, and more time could be devoted to lobster fishing. Supplies could be more easily procured than in the spring, when the roads are almost impassible.

It would be the means of conserving the lobster industry as lobsters do not spawn in the fall. Of course we could not avoid catching the female lobsters, but the wholesale destruction of the embryo fish would be avoided.

Dear mother, I have a few lines to let you know that we are both well and hope those lines may find you all the same.

What is dad doing? Has he given up his wild idea of going to Scotland yet? I would like to have a sight of Clinton; it must be nice down there now, for it is here. We are having splendid weather. I saw a lot of the boys from our dear old Battalion, Well, mother; this is a fine evening and most of our boys have gone to see a game of football between our side (No. 4) and No. two company.

We have been given permission to cut our trousers off just above the knee. I haven't got mine done yet. No one company has and they look all right, and are dandy and cool; for the weather is awfully hot just now and you know puttees are a warm thing anyway.

Things are quite quiet here, mother; we haven't been in anything big since April 9th. Suppose they are pretty well along with the planting down home by this time. I wouldn't mind a day or two with a team of colts myself, just for a change.

What do you suppose we will do when the war is over, for we are used to carrying our rifle and bayonet and all sorts of ammunition wherever we go. The boys are itching for another fight, and think they are restless, and that is bad; for poor old Fritz must be in an awful sweat all the time, for he doesn't know when a horde of us will be upon him; and it takes something to stop us, too. I have seen enough to know, and I lost a lot of chums in the last fight. I shan't forget, and next time we pay him a visit, no hard feelings, you know, but just the same he'll remember, too.

Suppose you had his boat out, he was bulking one of the water in joined up. I would send you some pictures, but we can't get any taken here, but Jim and I want some of all hands. Well, mother, Jim and I are fine, and could have been promoted but declined. Jim was offered stripes already, and I could have had mine, but we don't care for them.

GRACE CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of Grace Church was held on Wednesday evening, 27th inst. The financial statement, Dr. Ayers, reported receipts for church purposes, \$2,775.00. Expenditure, \$2,667.37, thus leaving a balance on hand of \$1,107.63. The total raised for all purposes, \$3,334.14.

The pastor's report showed that through special services in the church and Sunday school many conversions have been made during the year for Christ. Eight persons have been received into full church membership and sixteen on probation. Sixteen have renounced the world and transferred their allegiance to Christ. There were fifteen baptisms, fifteen.

An encouraging report from the Sunday school was presented by the superintendent, Mr. G. F. Hutchison. The average attendance during the year being 171. Total receipts, \$611.85.
