**NEW HYMNAL.**—Dr. Sprague, Sackville, who is well known in Charlottetown, has returned from Toronto, where he had been attending the sessions of the Hymn-book Committee. The compilation of the hymns for the new book he reports as now completed, but another meeting of the committee is regarded as necessary for settling sundry details which require attention before the work is put into the hands of the printer. The new Methodist hymn book will be considerably smaller than the old one. The latter contains 936 hymns, the one in preparation will have only about 700. The final committee meeting will be held in April.

The Reverend J. Abbot Winfield, through ill health of late has been compelled to tender his resignation as Rector of the Parish of Alberton and will retire to Bedford, N. S., with his son for some time. Mr. Winfield will be greatly missed, not only in the Parish, which he has so energetically worked and splendidly built up but also in the town of Alberton, where he has been first in everything for the betterment of the community. His bright geniality and strong personality has made him beloved by all. As a lecturer and preacher he was a man of great ability. This province also owes much to his enthusiasm and zeal in missionary work. The large number of farmers, laborers and girls who ever came to this Province were brought here by him. The farmers, all good men have made good and become prosperous citizens of this Province. Mr. Winfield had done a remarkable work in the Maritime Provinces where he is well known. It is understood that Mr. Winfield leaves Alberton about December the 8th.
