PASSENGER LINERS CREATE NEW RECORD

MONTREAL, April 17. — Arrival here today of the liners Montclare and Alauinia created a new record for early docking of passenger liners. The previous record was held by the Duchess of York which arrived here on April 18 last year. Eager ship news reporters boarding the Montclare after four and a half shipless months, were the victims of a comedy of errors as they searched for notable personages. Their first objective was Sir Arthur Salter, leading economist of the League of Nations who is scheduled to deliver the "Massey Foundation" lecture here. They were joined in their search by General Sir Arthur Currie, Principal of McGill University, and Col. Wilfred Bovey, Director of Extra-mural Relations of McGill University. Sir Arthur Salter, however, was not to be found as he boarded the train for Montreal shortly before the Montclare left Quebec.

Charles Plaxton, K.C., Ottawa, was also sought but found to be missing. He had intended to rejoin the ship at Quebec but missed it.

SHOULD SEE WAR DOES NOT TAKE PLACE

Oxford University Professor Touring Canada. Addresses Canadian Club.

OTTAWA, April 17.—The reaction of the North American continent to the forebodings of another war in Europe was that "we must somehow keep out of it." This was the interpretation given by Professor Reginald Coupland of Oxford University to the Canadian club here yesterday following an extensive tour through United States and Canada. In the closely-knit world of today, North America could not shelter behind the Atlantic ocean, he told his hearers. The credit and the civilization of this continent must be injured by such a disaster in Europe. It would be much more encouraging if the people of North America would take the attitude that "we will do all we can to see that such a war does not take place." Professor Coupland instructs the students of Oxford on "Colonial History" which he explained was an old fashioned name for the history of the British Commonwealth. He referred to Sir Robert Borden, who was at the luncheon, as one of the greatest figures in the development of Dominion status. "You no doubt speak to him as the former Prime Minister of Canada, but to me as professor at Oxford he is one of my associates."

MR. W. K. MURRAY

TRURO, N. S., April 15—W. K. Murray, ex-Mayor of Truro, passed away at his home on Queen Street, last night, after a lengthy illness. He was seventy-eight years of age and has been a resident of this town for most of his life. Born at North River, Colchester county, on July 5, 1855, he was a son of N. G. Murray and Elizabeth J. Dickson. His education was received in the schools at Truro. In 1885 he married Miss Emma Murray Dean, of Musquodoboit. Deceased was for a number of years a member of the Town Council, representing Ward 3, and for nine years served Truro as mayor. He was also active as a commissioner on the Truro Electric Light Commission, and for a number of years a member of the School Board.

He was a leader in Temperance circles and an elder of the First United Church. He also conducted an adult Bible class for many years. Mr. Murray is survived in his immediate family by his widow, one daughter and two sons. The daughter is Mrs. Gordon Leaman of Bridgewater, and the sons, Allen P. of Truro, and W. Keir, of Charlottetown. Two sisters, Mrs. A. McKenzie, of Truro, and Mrs. Deveau of Hartford, Conn., and two brothers, John Dixon Murray, of Fardis, B. C. and James A. Murray, of Boston, also survive.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon from the late home residence, 224 Queen Street, at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. W. McN. Matthews, pastor of the First United Church officiated. Revs. D. MacD. Clark and Rev. J. S. McKay assisted. Interment was in Robie Street Cemetery.

And praise to God forever give.

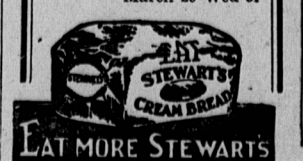

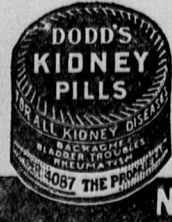
