The induction of Rev. Major H. McIntosh into the pastoral charge of the Bedouque congregation will take place on Thursday 25th inst in the North Bedouque church. A collection will be taken for the Presbytery fund.

A VERY creditable appearance is now presented by the site where formerly stood the Manse of St. James Church on Pownall Street. The ground has been nicely graded and graded, and presents an object lesson in city improvement which is happily becoming more or less general in the City.

The last copy of Sunset Magazine, of which one has been received by The Guardian, contains a number of articles dealing with Mexico. It is rarely that the one subject can be so diversely treated and at the same time make interesting reading, but Sunset has accomplished this result.

A NUMBER of schooners with cargoes of hard stone for the City streets have lately arrived. This stone it has been impossible to get during the summer as captains do not care to carry it when other cargoes are available. The street department will now be able to complete the macadamizing of Fitzroy street, a job which it was feared would have to be left over till the Spring. In consequence of the arrival of these cargoes the voice of the stone crusher is again to be heard on Pownall Wharf.

The bill of fare which came up for discussion at the Police Court yesterday was a large and varied order, although all the cases had for their principal ingredient the old trouble, drink. Peter Paul Gillis for a fourth breach of Prohibition Act was sentenced to six months imprisonment. This case has been postponed on a number of occasions, but finally the prosecutor brought evidence to bear which resulted in conviction. John Horne, convicted of a second breach of the Prohibition Act was given his choice of a fine of \$200 or four months imprisonment. John Inglis and John Donovan were each charged with a first offence under the same act, but were dismissed on hearing the evidence. Joseph Pembroke and Richard Gaul were each fined \$100 or three months imprisonment in jail. After this lengthy docket had been disposed of two drunks were very quickly got out of the way, John Cameron being fined \$10 or 30 days and Joseph McAleer \$2 or 10 days.
