NAZI-ISM ATTACKED AT PRESS PARLEY

Newly Formed Reich Confederation Disapproves of Hitler's Anti-Jewish Campaign.

By Louis M. Lochner, Associated Press Staff Writer. BERLIN, Nov. 4.—(A.P.)—A Catholic priest, a Protestant pastor, and two Christian Hebrew attorneys on behalf of millions of fellow Germans tonight impressively challenged the Hitler Government's extreme Nazi-ism and anti-Semitism.

Mouthpiece

The confederation aims to be a mouthpiece for those four to six million Germans who are Christian by birth and training, whose ever, fibre is devoted to Germany, and who by Nazi laws have been stamped as non-Germans because one of their parents or grandparents happened to belong to the Jewish race.

With deep emotion Attorney Gunther Alexander-Katz, a war veteran who won the Iron Cross and whose father held a high government position under the Hohenzollerns, described the lot of the Germans who have lately learned that somewhere in their family tree there is a Jewish limb.

Makes Appeal

"We are Germans and we want to remain German," Alexander-Katz, chairman of the Confederation, maintained in reference to those whose love for the fatherland and whose past service to the state have, he said, lately been set at naught.

enterprise or of departmental policy. months the breeding turkeys should receive only limited rations, as they have a tendency to become over fat if well fed. Hard grain should be given in preference to mash or ground grains. Equal parts of oats, wheat, and buckwheat are quite suitable during the cold months, but when the weather moderates in spring, the buckwheat should be discontinued. Once daily during winter is often enough to feed, and fresh water should be provided at least once a day.
