### CONSERVATIVE PLATFORM

1. An immediate and complete investigation in order to ascertain and reveal the true condition of the finances of the Province.
2. An immediate halt to the reckless debt increases of the last four years.
3. Abolition of the present pernicious system of appointing members of the Legislature to salaried Public Offices, in order to return to sound principles of responsible Government and to effect major economies.
4. Restoration to the citizens of their right of resort to the Courts of Justice of which they have been deprived by the Campbell Government.
5. The adaptation of our Educational System to the present actual needs of our Province including Youth Training; Encouragement of Credit Unions, co-operative Associations and other forms of Adult Education and Investigation into the high price of school books with the view of lessening the cost and adoption of a plan to prevent the frequent changes in text books.
6. A Policy of farm rehabilitation aimed primarily at placing practical young farmers upon farms at the lowest possible rate of interest.
7. Support of the dairying, hog raising and other branches of mixed farming and a Practical Policy of soil analysis in co-operation with the Federal Department of Agriculture, with a view of determining the fertilizer requirements of the land.
8. Continuation of the fight for lower freight rates on farm products and the extension of the policy of freight rates assistance on ground line throughout the entire year and also assistance to farmers in the purchase of lime.
9. A New Road Act will be introduced using the school district as a unit; greater attention to the repair and upkeep of the ordinary roads of the Province and a return to our policy of using local pit and shore gravel; a proper system of maintenance, conservation and drainage of hard surfaced roads; further extension of hard surfaced roads and gravelled roads as the finances of the Province warrant.
10. Continued Public Health Activity and assistance in establishing young physicians in country districts where there is no resident physician.
11. Fishermen's Relief will be given where necessary under proper supervision; Fishermen's Loans will be put on a proper business basis. A real effort will be made to secure better markets for fish. Investigation into the possibility of establishing plants for the manufacture of fish meal and other fish products.
12. Having in 1935 established our claims against the Dominion Government to the extent of three million dollars, giving this Province an increased subsidy of \$150,000 annually, we will continue to press for a full realization of our claims on the basis of the minority report of the White Commission.

### Makes Eloquent Appeal On Behalf Of The Red Cross

The following address was broadcast over the Canadian network last evening by His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBols:

"Fellow citizens of Canada: "I deem it a great privilege to speak briefly to you tonight on behalf of the Red Cross Society. "Seventy-five years ago this noble organization accepted the challenge that has come down to us through the ages "Who is my neighbour?" The Red Cross Society is by saying to the world that all men are created equal, that race or creed or station in life matters not, and that the humblest and lowliest citizen has the same right to live and to enjoy health and happiness as those occupying the highest positions in the land, and the encouraging part of it all is that no nation has dared to deny the truth of this assertion or to hinder this work of love and mercy. "During the past few months many of us have, in moments of discouragement, felt that our so-called civilization has been a failure, that Christianity and the principles of Democracy have been vain but in the midst of the darkness and gloom, there shines out one great light and one great hope to which man can cling, for despite the horror of war we know that cruelty, hatred and greed cannot wholly triumph in a world which fosters an organization like the Red Cross. While there are men and women willing to give all they have, even to life itself, not for honour, or possessions, nor even for patriotism, but solely to relieve those in sorrow, need, sickness and distress, we know for a certainty that Christianity and civilization have not failed. "But it is not in time of war alone that the Red Cross serves. This is but a small part of its service to the world. Whenever or wherever in civilized nations disaster or epidemic occurs there you will find the Red Cross carrying on a well planned peace time programme. The fight against tuberculosis which this organization is continually waging, and the care and attention which is being given to the crippled child would alone justify its existence. I have great faith in the future possibilities of the Junior Red Cross and I am proud to say that in this Province of Prince Edward Island Junior Red Cross has become deeply rooted in our schools and excellent results are being obtained. "By a curious coincidence the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Treaty of Geneva, which opened the way for the Red Cross, and the seventy-fifth anniversary of the birth of the Confederation of Canada occur this year which event will be celebrated in a fitting manner in Charlottetown in July. As we pledge anew our loyalty and our devotion to our country and Empire may the spirit of true patriotism inspire us to do our part in upholding the emblem of the Red Cross, so that its ser-

vice of love and mercy may be strengthened and extended, and let us not rest content until its torch of healing and health will shine into the darkest and most remote corners of the earth."
