Vitamin E Aids Rheumatic Victim

Fondly Remembered by Father, Mother and Brothers.

LONDON, Ont., Dec. 11. (CP)—A father who offered his daughter as a "guinea pig" to science a few weeks ago because doctors told him she was dying from rheumatic fever, said last night she is "a completely different little girl" after three weeks treatment with vitamin E.

Nine-year-old Hope Hickey from Pomeroy, Pa., has been under the care of Dr. Wilfred Shute of the Shute Institute, which recently opened a foundation in London in the midst of continued controversy over vitamin E treatment for heart ailments.

Seeing his daughter today for the first time since she came to London, Edward J. Hickey, Jr., 33, said she was "brighter" and greeted him with laughter and tears. He will leave London in a couple of days, but hopes to have her home for Christmas.

The case of Hope Hickey gained prominence in the United States when the father made a public plea to the Pennsylvania Medical Society. He said he would submit her to any operation or treatment in the aid of rheumatic fever even though she died in the test.

Organ Recital

In St. Pauls

Sunday evening, Dec. 6, in St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, music lovers were given a musical treat which will long be remembered, when Helen Stewart MacRae, A. T. C. M., and Royston F. Murgford, A.R.C.O., combined their talents in an outstanding programme of piano and organ selections.

Opening with a delightful sonata by Mozart, the artists captivated their audience by their impeccable musicianship.

Mrs. MacRae in her piano solo gave brilliant interpretations of Rachmaninoff's Prelude in G Sharp Minor, and Chopin's Polonaise, which were performed with marked clarity and grace. Of particular interest was Mr. Murgford's rendition of Passacaglia, for organ, a composition of William Kell Rogers—this City. Based on the form of a slow dance of Spanish origin, a growing crescendo led to a stirring and masterful climax. In this group, Boellmann's Toccata also merits special mention.

The highlight of the evening came with the presentation of the Grieg Concerto in A Minor, which was performed with exceptional understanding sympathy and brilliance.

The programme was as follows: Sonata No. 16 in A—Mozart; William Kell Rogers—this City; Prelude in G Sharp Minor—Rachmaninoff; Polonaise No. 4 in C Minor—Chopin; Passacaglia—W. K. Rogers; Priere a Notre Dame and Toccata, from Suite Gothique—Boellmann; Concerto in A Minor—Grieg.

Mrs. MacRae and Mr. Murgford are truly to be congratulated upon their brilliant presentation of this outstanding programme. It is to be hoped that the people of Charlottetown will be given an opportunity of hearing these gifted artists in recital in the near future.

"GREAT WALTZ" GLORIOUS FILM MUSICAL LOVE STORY

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 11. (AP)—Edgar Bergen announced last night he is retiring temporarily from radio after 12 years as an air star.

Bergen's show was recently dropped by its sponsor, Standard Brands. A deal for sponsorship by Coca-Cola fell through.

The creator of Charlie McCarthy and Mortimer Snerd declared the current situation in radio baffles him when a show like "Stop the Music" with no entertainment value can take away listeners from other shows that are trying to do

a good job of entertaining. Bergen's retirement adds another loss to NBC's one-time solid Sunday line-up. Jack Benny will spring over to CBS Jan. 3 and Fred Allen has said he will retire from radio after this season.

PROBE NAIL SHORTAGE

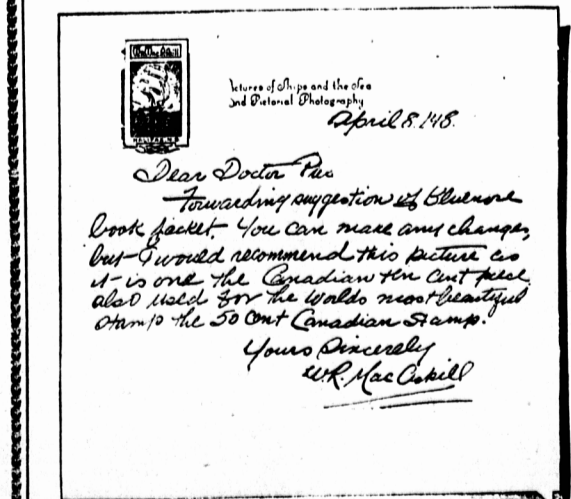
