SGT. M. ISZAK ADDRESSES ROTARY — Sgt. Marienne Iszak of the R.C.A.F. was the guest speaker at the Rotary Club yesterday. She outlined the reasons for the formation of the Women's Division of the R.C.A.F. Stressing the importance of contributing our utmost to the war effort, she pointed out that young women can perform a valuable service to their country by releasing men for air crew duties. Sgt. Iszak described the method by which women are chosen and the various phases through which they pass, the Recruiting Centre, the Manning Depot, the Training Depot, and finally the Station to which they are assigned for duty. At the present time four-fifths of the women enlisted are trained for duty after they enlist in the Air Force. For that reason, they have to be intelligent, quick-grasping young women because the period of training given them is necessarily short. In 1942, approximately 5,000 airwomen were released for aircrew duties by the airwomen, Messrs. G. J. Tweedy and D. M. Gass were joint chairmen at the meeting. Mr. J. H. MRS. WENDELL MULLINS

Many friends learned with feeling of sorrow and deepest sympathy of the death on April 4th of Mrs. Wendell Mullins, 77 years old, daughter of Mrs. Reedy and the late Edward Reedy and beloved wife of Wendell Mullins of Charlottetown.

Maritimes Art Gallery

TREASURE

Examples of early Egyptian, Grecian, Persian, Indian and Chinese crafts are now in possession of the Art Association of Montreal and were described in an illustrated lecture given last night by Cleveland Morgan to the Maritime Women's Club at the Arts and Letters room, held in the Art Galleries, St. Brock Street west Montreal under the chairmanship of Miss D. L. Gass.

Exhibits shown varied in period and format from a Grecian terra cotta (the dated early 6th century B. C. to an example of modern Swedish in Orffors glass, and included pieces of pottery, and china, bronzes, tapestries and paintings, as well as furniture. Details and history or origin of the pieces and brief background sketches of the period were given by Mr. Morgan as each slide was presented.

Following the lecture the members were permitted to visit the museum to view the collection. Dr. C. P. Martin, president of the Art Association also spoke briefly.

Mrs. G. R. McLeod the president was in the chair and introduced Mr. Morgan who was thanked by Mrs. Neville, President of sister organization, Messrs. Gass of the Maritime Club—Montreal Star.
