"The Pilgrimage To Vimy" And "Devil's Playground" At Prince Edward

A powerful and dynamic drama, "Devil's Playground," which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre, unassumingly lays claim to being one of the most entertaining films of the new season. In breath-taking tempo it tells a story of sunken submarines and shattered lives. Richard Dix, as the rather glib and unsuspiciously says who is the "best deep sea diver in the U. S. Navy," turns in a well-nigh perfect performance. Chester Morris, as Dix's pal and a "Don Juan" among girls of every port, provides the element of dramatic clash. The story, based on a triangle in which Carmen (Dolores Del Rio) plays fast and loose with the honest affections of Dorgan (Richard Dix), provides plenty of virile action, especially in connection with the sinking of the submarine, imprisoning Mason (Chester Morris) and the crew. Scenes of shipwreck, in Manila and other picturesque ports, and inside the sunken submarine, provide an array of striking backgrounds for the action. The picture was directed by Eric C. Kenton. Miss Del Rio has she ever performed more capably in a role which provides plenty of dramatic opportunity. "Salute to Valour," the picture is called and is the official Canadian Government picturization of the Vimy Pilgrimage. From the time the great peace-time armada of Canadian veterans sailed from the shores of Canada in 1918 until they again crossed the Channel from England as guests of the French Government, each incident of the pilgrimage of one-time warriors is faithfully and beautifully described and pictured on the screen. The scene in Scotland, at the prime grave of Sir Douglas Haig, at the tomb of the French unknown warrior, in historic Westminster Hall filled to capacity with Canadian veterans who were addressed by Stanley Baldwin, the Prime Minister, and the impressive rights at the sacred heart of the Empire, the Cenotaph at Whitehall, are each pictured for eternity and are crowned only by the feature of the picture, the unveiling of Canada's memorial atop Vimy Ridge, by King Edward VIII.

UNEQUALLED IN HISTORY

The reception accorded King Edward later at a garden party in Buckingham Palace by his Canadian guests is something that history has not equaled. Seated in groups as if at a school picnic in the shadow of the Palace itself, these

Footprints on the newly varnished floor were noticed by employees when the Robert Simpson Eastern, Limited, was opened for business yesterday. A quick check-up by the management revealed two radios were missing.
As workmen were engaged in varnishing the floors until after 11 p. m. Wednesday night belief was expressed the break took place some time after midnight. Entrance was gained by removing the cover from a hatch which was left unfastened, police said.
Lewior's garage on Cumberland Street was broken into and the urn of eight dollars removed in another break, it was reported.
Notified by watchmen on duty on an upper floor of the Holy Name Hall where a hospital tea was held Wednesday afternoon a

man was frightened away from a basement window early yesterday after breaking a pane of glass in which was believed to be an attempt to enter the premises. The hall was entered earlier this week when the thief or thieves left empty-handed after forcing open a safe to find it only contained cancelled cheques.
The floor was not illuminated while the watchmen patrolled. A flashlight the prowler was using attracted their attention. As they proceeded to the street they heard the crash of glass and later saw a man running away. As their duty was to protect the contents of the hall they did not give chase, it was said. It was reported the prowler left behind a bag of apples.
