WILL SUE FOR \$25,000 DAMAGES.

Malcolm McKinnon Brings a Suit Against McLaughlin Carriage Co., and Others for False Arrest.

St. John, March 9.—St. John will have a very interesting lawsuit next June, when Malcolm McKinnon, of P. E. Island, who was recently brought here on criminal warrant and examined before Magistrate Ritchie on charge of embezzlement, will proceed against The McLaughlin Carriage Company, J. W. V. Lawlor, local manager, and Daniel Mott, traveller, for damages, for false arrest and malicious prosecution. Mr. McKinnon regards the proceedings taken against him by the McLaughlin Carriage Co., as absolutely unwarranted.

Dr. L. A. Currey, counsel for Mr. McKinnon, said this morning that the writs have already been issued, but have not yet been served, as the persons on whom they are to be served reside at different points. Those to be served are the representative of the McLaughlin Carriage Co. in P. E. Island, J. W. V. Lawlor, local manager here, and Daniel Mott, of Kings County, N. B. Damages to the extent of \$25,000 or more will be claimed. Dr. Currey has received no instructions to proceed against Magistrate Ritchie along with the others.

St. John considered the most desirable place to conduct the suit, as the McLaughlin Carriage Co., have some valuable property and stock here, which in the event of the suit going against them for substantial damages could be readily seized upon in satisfaction.

Many of the witnesses will be brought from P. E. Island.
