Kyle Stages Comeback In Late Stages To Win British Amateur Title

Drillon Hurls All Stars To First Victory

MONCTON, N. B., May 28—(AP)—Behind the four-hit pitching of Gordon Drillon, National Hockey League star, Moncton Aces defeated Stellarton Monarchs 6-2 Saturday in the first of two games for the Maritime senior softball title.

The second contest, with total runs counting, will be played at Stellarton next Saturday.

Leading Aces toward their four-run advantage, Drillon blazed a fast ball throughout the game and was seldom in trouble. He fanned 13 of the yellow-shirted Monarchs. Moncton bats met the slow, tricky pitching of elongated Roy Potts for a total of seven safeties.

In three trips to the plate Drillon batted out two hits. His flashy catcher, Lyle Steeves, also had a brace of hits in five times. No Stellarton player made more than one hit.

A crowd estimated at 450 watched the first game of the series for the 1938 title. The playoff was postponed last fall because arrangements could not be made early enough to finish the series.

Binns And Patterson To Meet Here

Destroyers On Way Back To Base

MONTEAL, May 28—(CP)—The Canadian destroyers Skeena and Saguenay, which escorted the liner Empress of Australia up the St. Lawrence River to Quebec with the King and Queen sailed today for their base at Halifax after a stay of several days in Montreal.

At Halifax, the Skeena will be fitted out to carry the King and Queen June 14 from Cape Tormentine, N. B., to Charlottetown, and then to Pictou, N. S. Their Majesties will sail for England the following day in the liner Empress of Britain, which will stop briefly at Newfoundland.

Baer Says He'll Win In 6 Rounds

(By Sid Feder Associated Press Sports Writer) FERRISDALE, N. Y., May 28—(AP)—Maxie Baer today predicted he will knock out Lou Nova in six rounds or fewer at the Yankee Stadium Thursday night.

Rated off his semi-final workout this afternoon, it looked as though Maxie, if he does it, might manage it with a left hand instead of the roundhouse right he has been firing at all his opponents but Joe Louis and Jim Braddock, for these years.

Most of those who have seen both in action still like Nova's chances, however, largely because the California kid is just as deadly by serious as the one-time madcap Maxie, and has six years advantage in youth.

Maxie's condition is as near perfect as it will ever be, but the fact he's now 30 stands against him Thursday when a victory means a shot at the heavyweight championship in September. Max, however, doesn't think his age means a thing.

"If you want to know," he said, "I'm going to flatten this young upstart, and I won't take 13 rounds, or even 10. We'll pick up the marbles in six."

Max weighed 215 pounds when he started his workout today.

Qualifying Time Fastest In History As Drivers Prepare For Racing Classic

INDIANAPOLIS, May 28—A full field of 33 cars—the fastest in history—was qualified today to start the annual 500-mile Indianapolis motor speedway race here Tuesday.

There were 34 qualifiers in all and the slowest of them—George Robson of Huntington Park, Calif.—was eliminated automatically.

Billy Devore of St. John, Kas., became the 33rd starter with a speed of 118.428 miles an hour. Others who qualified today were Al Miller of Detroit, at 123.238 miles an hour; Lloyd Davis of Springfield, Ill., 119.375; A. B. (Deason) Lita of Dubois, Pa., 117.979; Harry MacQuinn of Milwaukee, 117.287 and Louis Tomi of Portland, Ore., 118.428.

The 33 starters in the race averaged 123.547 miles an hour in their qualifying runs. That was the highest average in history. Only five of the starters had a qualifying speed of less than 120 miles an hour.

Four former winners of the 500-mile classic will be in the starting lineup. They are Louie Meyer of Huntington Park, Calif.; Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis; Kelly Paffilo of Los Angeles and Floyd Roberts of Van Nuys, Calif.
