New Store Of
Disease Remedies

By Howard W. Blakeslee, Associated Press Science Editor (By Guardian's Special Wire) PHILADELPHIA, May 1.—Concentrated in the bodies of human mothers, a new store of remedies against some of the major diseases has been discovered at Harvard University.

The remedies come from substances evidently concentrated by the mother's body as a protection for her child. They include protectives for measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria and infantile paralysis.

They were described by Charles F. McKhann, Professor of Pediatrics and communicable diseases at Harvard to the American College of Physicians meeting here.

These substances are called antibodies, the name given by the medical profession to a great number of chemicals of unusual nature which living bodies form for their own protection against disease.

Dr. McKhann said the antibodies found so concentrated in mothers probably had their source in her own exposure at some time in her life to the ills for which they were the protection. They are extracted from the placenta.

Other physicians said it was astonishing that the medical records do not indicate much if any search previously in this human source for potent resistors to disease. In the animal kingdom use of the placenta is virtually universal. That fact has been well known. The reason may be that animal instinct realized the protective values.

Quintuplets
To Grace 1936
Calendars

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, May 1—A million pictures of the Dionne quintuplets will grace 1936 calendars through an agreement announced today by Joseph Sedgwick of the Ontario Attorney-General's Department.

Arrangements were completed by a large lithographing company in the United States, the copyright holders of photographs of the babies and Mr. Sedgwick acting with the board of guardians for the little Dionnes.

Royalties which may amount to \$35,000 will be paid into the quintuplets' fund. The Company's Canadian agents will hold rights in Canada.
