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East Prince Ministerial Ass'n Meets

The regular monthly meeting of the East Prince Ministerial Association was held in the Presbyterian Manse, North Tryon, on Monday with the president, Rev. James MacGowan, in the chair and the secretary, Mr. C. A. Hicks, on duty. A devotional period was led by Rev. P. G. Head of Hampton. The secretary introduced Rev. E. R. MacWilliams, Field Secretary of the Maritime Temperance Federation to the meeting. After routine business had been transacted two papers were given. The first entitled, "Applying the Gospel to the Home" by Rev. Wm. Bilson, Summerside, in which the speaker emphasized that the home is the fundamental institution; from it the nation gets its population, the church its people and the school its pupils. The great problem today is the spiritual temperature of the home. In the home, he said, children are trained for life and not from books but by example. The second paper was by Dr. S. R. Prince on "Applying the Gospel to Church Attendance." He said that unquestionably one of the great tragedies is the lack of a desire to have a church home, a tabernacle of the Lord. Embracing on this theme homiletically, the speaker applied the Gospel to Church Attendance under three headings: The Gospel in song; the Gospel in prayer; the Gospel in sermon. A lively discussion followed of both papers and a formal vote of thanks was extended to both speakers.—S

After the singing of hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past" and prayer by the president, Mrs. Emery Linkletter gave the first reading "Jesus came preaching, the Spirit of the Lord is upon me because the Lord hath anointed me to preach good tidings, to proclaim liberty to the captives and to bind up the broken hearted." Mrs. Harry Linkletter spoke of a world bound in chains of cruel slavery, superstition, war, sin in high places, making the kind of world which Paul described in the epistle to the Romans. Mrs. William Bilson's message was on Good Mother's stating that mothers of the world must unite for peace, for justice, for a kindly human understanding and never to pass up an opportunity of serving our fellow man. She finished her talk with the vivid story of a great negro singer who had dedicated his splendid voice to "the battle for universal tolerance. The meeting closed with the repeating of the Missionary benediction.
