EVANGELISTIC MEETINGS.—The special evangelistic services in the Baptist Church begins tonight at eight o'clock. They will continue each night this week except Saturday. The meetings are open to the people, who will be cordially welcomed.

THE INWARD TRAINS.—The southern express arrived in Charlottetown Saturday at 10.00 a. m., fifteen minutes late; the Eastern express at 10.20 a. m., on time; the Western express at 11.50 a. m., twenty minutes late, and the Summerside accommodation at 6.00 p. m., forty five minutes late.

CHIEF SARK.—Chief John Sark, a full-blooded Indian of the Micmac tribe, Lennox Island, P. E. I., has arrived at Quebec on his way to Ottawa to present a petition to Hon. Robert Rogers requesting him to put a gasoline launch or steamboat on the ferry between Lennox Island and Prince Edward Island. He paid his respects to Lieut.-Governor Langeher, Moncton, and left for Montreal en route to Ottawa.

CADETS SHOOT.—On Saturday afternoon the Queen Square Cadet Corps shot in the competition for places on the Imperial Cadet Team for 1913. This competition, which is open to Cadets all over Canada, is shot at each local corps' headquarters with a 22 rifle, range 25 yards. When all the returns are in the five highest scores, the possible being 280, will be chosen to go to Bieleys as each year a certain number are privileged to go. The shooting took place at the Agricultural building and resulted as follows—L. McKenna, total 218, W. Maddigan, total 208; C. Monaghan, total 196.

ARTISTIC PAINTING.—A very artistic oil painting is on display in the window of James Paton and Co's store. It was very cleverly painted on canvas by Mr. Paton's daughter Mrs. John Fraser of this city. The picture is one of St. Dunstan's Cathedral when it was wrapped in flames on the night of the fire when the roof had fallen and the most of the walls standing and both spires burning. It is attracting much attention and very favorable comment on Mrs. Fraser's skill as an artist, and Charlottetown may feel proud of having one capable of painting so real and cleverly a picture of that memorable event.

A WRECK.—A wreck upon the Grand Trunk Railway, forty miles this side of Ottawa, occurred on Thursday morning, at ten o'clock. On board the train at the time returning to the Capital from the Island, were Senator B. C. Prowse and Senator Dr. Murphy. It was reported in the Ottawa papers that Senator Prowse had been seriously hurt, but all will be glad to learn from a telegram received by his brother Mr. L. E. Prowse, that although the Senator was injured in the wreck, it was not serious. The despatch further states that he is resting easy and expects to be all right in a few days. Nothing is reported about Senator Murphy so the presumption is that he escaped without injury.

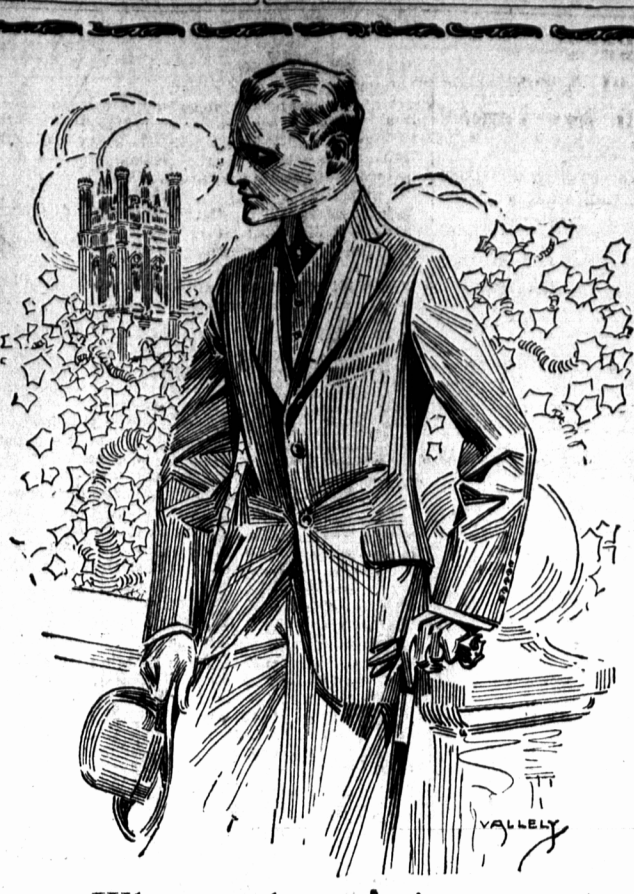

Vital Statistics Public Notice

By an Act of the Legislature of 1910 and amended in 1912, Births occurring in Prince Edward Island must be registered within thirty (30) days of their occurrence and Deaths within seven (7) days, with the District Registrar, who is also Road-master for the district.

In Summerside and Georgetown registrars must be made in accordance with the Act with the Registrar specially appointed for the purpose in Charlottetown with the Registrar at the Department of Agriculture.

The duty of reporting to the District Registrar falls upon the parents or other members of the family. The physician in attendance must certify to the cause of death.

The penalty in each case is a fine of from \$1.00 to \$20.00 and costs.
