DIED IN PORTLAND.—The death occurred at Portland, Me., on December 29th, of James O. Stewart, aged 49, son of the late James Stewart, formerly of Charlottetown. For about twenty years the former resided in Boston, where he had been engaged in the commission and brokerage business. He subsequently removed to Portland. Mr. Stewart has been a sufferer for the past two months with cancer of the tongue to which he succumbed despite the most skilled medical treatment and devoted nursing. He leaves a widow and two daughters, Alice, stenographer in Edmonton, and Minnie who is residing with her aunt, Mrs. Senator Robertson of Montague. One sister, Eva, wife of Henry Gordon of Edmonton survives him. The late Mr. Stewart visited the Island in October last, and appeared then to be in his usual robust health except that he had complained of a slight gathering on the tongue, which subsequently developed into cancer. Mr. Stewart was an energetic and general business man whose death while in the prime of manhood will be deeply regretted by a wide circle of friends.

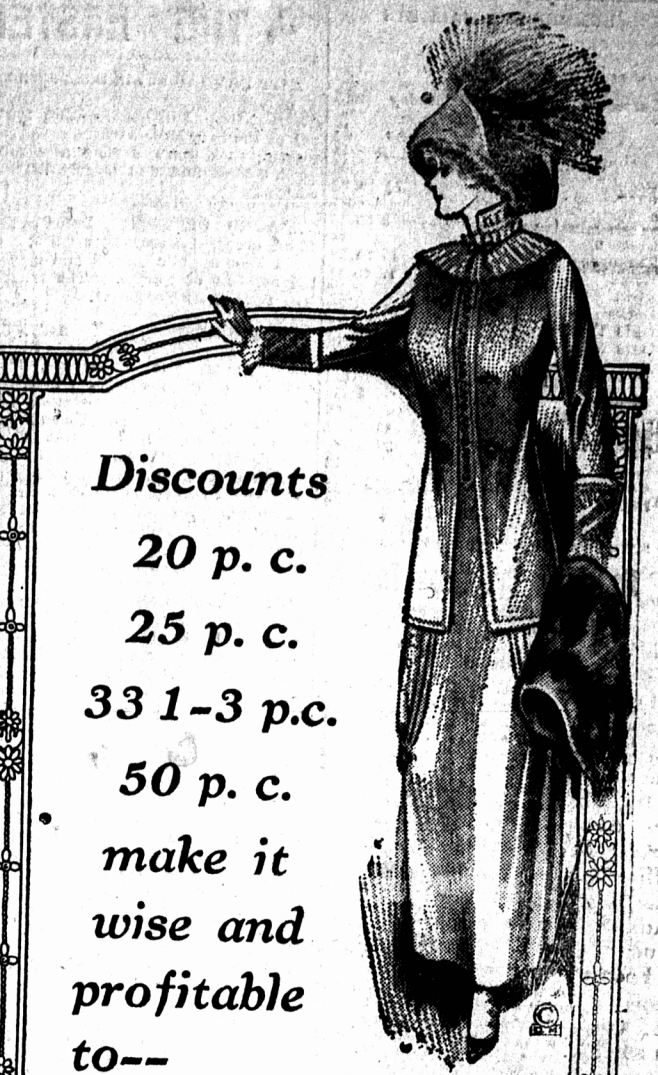

THE MILITARY EXCHANGE TO BE EXTENDED

LONDON, Jan. 4.—The question of an interchange of military officers between Great Britain and the dominions, which has received the strong advocacy of Colonel Sam Hughes, the Canadian minister of militia, and Senator Pearce, the Australian minister of defense, was raised in the house of commons to-day, when Sir G. Parker asked the colonial secretary and the war minister how many imperial officers were at present serving in the dominions, and how many dominion officers were employed at the British war offices or engaged in British military service. Colonel J. E. B. Seely, the secretary of state for war, replied that the number of imperial officers in the dominions' service was: Canada, 36; Australia, 11; South Africa, 14; New Zealand, 16, this being exclusive of officers holding appointments as aides-de-camp.
