OF SPECIAL INTEREST

HAMBURG, Germany, March 8 (Special)—Sixty-six men were drowned early today when the German torpedo boat destroyer S. 178 was rammed and sunk off Heligoland Island by the cruiser York. Only four men were saved.

The disaster occurred in the North Sea during night manoeuvring in the dark. The S. 178 was cut in two and sunk immediately.

Emperor William while at Wilhelmshaven Monday to attend the launching of a new German dreadnought had inspected the S. 178.

The disaster occurred two miles south of Heligoland Island. The cruiser was steaming at half speed when she struck the torpedo boat destroyer amidships. There was a crush of steel on steel and a mighty rush of waters. Immediately afterwards the shouts of the crew of the destroyer rose in the darkness.

The York immediately flashed signals that a terrible accident had happened and turned her searchlight upon the damaged destroyer, which was then all but submerged.

Lights sprang up all over the fleet and wireless messages were sent to Cuxhaven giving notice that a disaster had occurred.

Boats were lowered from the nearby warships, but before they could reach the scene of disaster, the riven torpedo boat had disappeared and only bits of floating wreckage marked the grave of the vessel.

Several lifeless bodies were picked up. For hours the boats searched in the glare of searchlight, looking for survivors, but found only four.

From the suddenness of the accident it was evident that many members of the crew of the S. 178 were caught and drowned like rats in a trap.

Word of the disaster was sent to Emperor William and Admiral von Tirpitz, imperial minister of marine. A rigid official inquiry was at once ordered.

The cruiser York is a powerful vessel but her bow plates were smashed by the impact and in her hull at the water line a big jagged hole was torn.

tary bill increasing the term of service in the active army to three days when the Cabinet submitted the years instead of two was made to measure to Parliament.

When the bill was laid on the table of the Chamber of Deputies it was accompanied by a declaration from the Ministry expressing the profound conviction that the proposal must be France, but for the peace of Europe adopted not only for the security of which depended entirely on the equilibrium of the great nations of Europe being maintained.

The government did not endeavor in any way to conceal the fact that a heavy task was about to be laid upon the French people, whose clear vision and patriotism would, in the government's opinion, undoubtedly overcome all hesitations and all contingencies.

The measure will add to the peace effective of the French army 150,000 men and not 210,000 as was at first stated, since greater care is to be exercised in the selection of recruits.

The system of two years' service, which has been in existence since 1885, has, according to the government, proved insufficient for the complete training of the men, while the decrease in the birth rate in France also tended to make an additional year necessary if France was to maintain an adequate defence.

LONDON, March 11 (Special)—A verdict of accidental death was returned at the inquest held at Bulford Camp on Geoffrey England, a young aviator who was killed on Salisbury Plain.

The tragedy was witnessed by Prince Cantacuzene and several Roumanian officers, the monoplane England flew being intended for the Roumanian army.

GENOA, March 11 (Special)—Changing the heavy floats of Mr. Laurens' hydro-aeroplane for lighter ones prevented the continuation of his journey toward Rome today. Since Tuesday a crowd has gathered on the Molo Giano as far as the Lido to see the machine fly.

Mr. Laurens therefore made a special twenty minute flight for the benefit of the crowd at five o'clock today when the machine was ready. He took as a passenger Jules Hachet, the French Vice Consul in Genoa.

Steamships blew their sirens and dipped their colors and the public was enthusiastic. Messrs. Laurens and Schneider early tomorrow will make for Spezia, where the naval authorities will receive them, and their southward journey will then be continued.

Messrs. Laurens and Schneider flew from Beaulieu, France, to Genoa, Italy, on board a Deperdussin hydro-aeroplane last Tuesday in one hour and fifty-two minutes, not including a long stop at Spotorino, owing to a leak in the petrol tank. This was the first hydro-aeroplane flight of two persons between two countries.
