BRITISH SCIENTISTS STUDIES MAGNETISM

MANCHESTER, England, Nov. 25 — (CP) — Prof. P. M. S. Blackett, winner of a Nobel Prize for Physics, disclosed here today that for nine months he has been directing experiment in coal mines to discover whether the magnetism of the earth increases or decreases at lower levels. He said conclusions were "very important". Although experiments were in a primary stage, decreases had been recorded here and in South Africa. Some of the experiments have been conducted in Parsonage Colliery, Leigh, the deepest in Britain. Students from the University of Manchester have been working there for several months in high temperatures.

Djungua Curse Is Blamed For Expedition Mishap

DARWIN, Australia, Nov. 25 — (REUTERS) — Maybe the curse of Djungua has fallen on the Australian-American expedition to Arnhem Land. Djungua, in aborigine mythology, is the spirit who made the land and all sacred places. Before history, the natives say, Djungua rose from the blue sea like a cloud, stepped ashore at Port Bradshaw—Yallamburra—on Cape Arnhem. Aborigines say the expedition's accidents happened because Djungua is annoyed. Even scholarly expedition members, not superstitious, but his mysterious power "blackfella spirit business has put a hoodoo on use of Djungua's tropical sea off Australia's north coast. This is what happened: The barge Phoenix, carrying expedition members, was stranded and damaged on her voyage to Groote Eylandt. The boat Wanderer II, which went to meet the Phoenix, was storm-battered and nearly wrecked when she took refuge in Trial Bay. The Sajara, a mission boat on expedition business, was wrecked off lonely Cape Arrowsmith. The Victory, another mission vessel, broke down in Darwin harbor as soon as it was contracted to carry supplies. Later she put to sea but hit a mysterious rock in the East Alligator River and had to return to Darwin. The Peron, a local trading vessel carrying supplies, rolled over and sank in the same river.

Missing For Days

Wanderer II was missing for days on another occasion and her skipper suffered a serious illness. Victory set off for Yirrkala, an expedition base, but was mysteriously diverted into the East Alligator River against the interests of the expedition. A coastal barge broke down in Darwin the day she was contracted to carry supplies. When the native affairs patrol vessel Phantom was hired, the body of one of her aboriginal crew was found floating in the harbor.

At Yirrkala, an Australian photographer with the expedition was flung out of a small boat by a huge wave and an American anthropologist was stranded on a sandbar when his canoe disappeared. At Port Bradshaw there is a granite pillar which the aborigines claim marks the spot where Djungua stepped ashore. Most of the accident's sufferers in the Port Bradshaw area.

The aborigines say that to interfere with the sacred places and symbols which Djungua made is "dangerous business." Lately, on patrol, they have been saying: "Me frightened." The scientists camped on a sacred burial ground at Yirrkala. They have studied and taken away many sacred symbols. Now they are thinking that Djungua and Pharaoh Tut-Ankh-Amen may have a curse in common.

JOHANNESBURG, Nov. 25 — (CP) — A swimming suit, designed by the Public Morality Committee of the Dutch Reformed Church as an alternative to "scandalously bare" creations, is on sale here. The suit is modelled on the style of a sleeveless tennis costume with a fairly wide skirt. It reaches down to three inches above the knee and the neck-line is cut round and high. A fairly heavy material is used. Denim for the new style has been small and few of the suits have been sold. A member of the committee said the costume has proved popular with middle-aged women who are stout but that young girls seem to prefer the "scantily" imported two-piece suits. "If a large number of women adopt our costume, they will shame others, who walk around scandalously bare, into wearing it too," he said.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 — (CP) — Horace Greeley's advice about going west apparently applies to married couples as well as young men. If surveys are still to be believed, a recent coast-to-coast tab conducted by the Domestic Relations Clinic of the National Association of Women Lawyers, reports that marriages in southern California and other parts of the west turn out to last much longer and are much happier. Of course, Hollywood was excluded from the survey. "Down in the southern part of the country people feel good," theorized Miss Muriel Richtig, who is national chairman of the Clinic and who conducted the survey.
