Next Wednesday is the date of the Canadian Navy Tea in St Peter's Schoolroom.

C. C. Carver has sold his farm at Mt. Mellick to Frederick Richards of the same place. Mr. Carver intends going west shortly.

Parker Hooper sang an extra illustrated song at the Bijou Theatre last evening and was much appreciated by the large audience present.

Rev. H. Scott-Smith, Centreville, N. S., Assistant priest in St. Peter's Cathedral, City, arrived here by the Northumberland yesterday afternoon.

At the girls' bazaar in St James' Hall this evening there will be dressed dolls, dolls' hats and other necessities; also a flower, cake and candy table. The admission is but five cents; bazar opens at seven and program at eight.

The election campaign, being held in connection with the Mock Parliament at St. Dunstan's College, is in full swing. Premier McNeill has appealed to the county on the strength of an economic and progressive platform, of which the most important planks are:—First, the immediate establishment of a Canadian Navy; 2nd, The prohibition of importation and sale of intoxicating liquors in Canada; 3rd, Government ownership of Railway Telegraph and Telephone systems. Leader Rooney of the Opposition has announced his policy as opposed to the establishment of a navy at the present time maintaining that Canada is as yet not in a position to support such an expenditure. Against the second plank of the Government the Opposition, as tried in P. E. Island and other parts of Canada, has not proved a success. As to the Government ownership of public systems. Leader Rooney's followers contend that the I. C. R., a Government owned railway, sinks money every year, and they think it unwise to take such a step. Wednesday was Nomination Day, and the nominations of John J. McIsaac for the Government, and that of Charles J. McDonald for the Opposition were received. Last night was devoted to debating the questions at issue by the prominent speakers on both sides. For the Government, Messrs McIsaac, Durand, W. V. McDonald and A. Rooney gave excellent speeches, in which they clearly defined their party's stand on all issues. On the Opposition side, C. J. McDonald, Beaudain, J. A. McDonald and J. C. McDonald, in telling arguments, combated the Government's policy. The speeches of Messrs Beaudain and Durand were in French, and they stirred the Quebec men to an intense degree of feeling. The election is to take place on Wednesday, Dec 7, and every vote to debating the respective policies of the parties. Feeling runs high and a vigorous canvass is being made by both candidates. Mr. McDonald, the Opposition candidate is an experienced politician, having represented, for one term, the Legislative district of Oregon in the Legislature of that state. This fact gives him considerable prestige among the student body, but Mr. McIsaac, his opponent, has already gained the confidence of the students, and during the years he has spent with us, his name has always held a prominent place in debating circles. As yet, one cannot safely judge as to the result—the contestants being so evenly matched, and it is safe to say that excitement in and around the college will be at fever height by December seventh.

The S. S. Northumberland arrived in this port at 5.45 p.m. yesterday.

The auction sale of surplus stock at Boswell Jenkin's, Mr. Albion, on Monday was largely attended. F. H. Horne was the auctioneer and he secured fancy prices for the stock offered.

The western mail train arrived in this city at nine fifty-five last evening being five minutes late. The morning train from the east was ten minutes late, the Cape Traverse train twenty-five minutes late, the morning train from the west forty and the evening train from the east twelve minutes. The Murray Harbor train arrived here on time.

The steamer Stigstag of the Black Diamond Line is undergoing extensive repairs to her machinery in this port. Bruce Stewart & Co. Ltd. are doing the work. They have two shifts—one night and one day—employed, each consisting of about twelve men. The work will hardly be completed before Saturday. The Stigstag was pretty badly shaken up on her recent trip from Montreal and is considerably damaged inside.

Rev. H. E. Thomas, pastor of the First Methodist Church, City, leaves this morning for St. John and from there he will proceed to a sanitarium for treatment. Mr. Thomas has not regained his strength as quickly as was to be desired and it is hoped that in this move he is adopting a plan whereby he may be rapidly restored to his usual health and vigor. He has been granted a sufficient leave of absence from the church and the duration of his trip is indefinite. Last evening Mr. Thomas was waited on by a committee from the Church and presented with a well filled purse. This kindly action on the part of the church Mr. Thomas greatly appreciated while the donors, for themselves and the congregation, expressed the earnest wish that Mr. Thomas might soon return fully restored in health, a wish which will be heartily concurred in by his many friends and acquaintances here.

The benefit given in the People's Theatre last evening, in aid of the Catholic Orphanage, was most generously patronized.
