IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ALEXANDER McLEAN

On June the 14th death again visited Red Point and removed another of the old landmarks in the person of Jessie Bruce, wife of Alexander McLean, in the 76th year of her age. Some years ago she suffered a great deal from cancer, but for the last six months she was confined to her bed with heart trouble and rheumatism. She was a consistent member of the East Point Baptist Church for the last fifty-eight years, and for the last forty-five years her home was the home of stranger hunger and cold, and for that time her home was also a home for ministers and their wives, and many a clergyman spent his vacation there. She leaves to mourn an adopted daughter, Emma Kitson, daughter of the late Rev. Mr. Kitson; also an adopted son, Edwin McDonald, both of the United States, her aged husband, one brother, A. W. Bruce, and one sister, wife of John Bruce. Her charity was known by all who came in contact with her. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Henry McDonald, of Kingsborough.

MRS. DONALD McDONALD

Died at Riverdale, June 28th, 1917, at the residence of her son in law, John McKinnon, Flora McKinnon, relict of the late Donald McDonald, of Churchill, who predeceased 7 years ago in the 87th year of her age. Deceased was born in Isle of Mull, Scotland, and immigrated to this country with her parents when only a little over two years old. Of 64 souls which sailed from Tisbury by way of Cape Breton and landed in Charlottetown on August 17th, 1823, for the last few years there were only two living, deceased and Mr. John McKinnon of Churchill former editor and proprietor of the Pioneer. The funeral sermon was preached by her pastor, Rev. D. McLean, and was very impressive. She leaves to mourn her loss four sons and three daughters, namely, Neil, Churchill, Malcolm and Mrs. John A. McKinnon, Riverdale, Daniel, Edward and Mrs. Agnes Salisbury, Paquet, L. J., and Mrs. J. C. Mochnern, Providence, R. I. The pall bearers were Neil McKinnon, Duncan McGillivray, John McFadyen, Charles McKinnon, Archibald McFadyen and Ewen McFadyen. Interment took place at Argyle Shore.

CHARLES ALBERT STEWART

Charles Albert Stewart died at five minutes after eleven o'clock Sunday June 11th at his home in Punaia Valley Honolulu, after a long illness. He came out to the Island in 1884, while on Maui he was with the Wailuku Railroad Co., later going to Hawaii with his family to accept a position on the Korala Plantation. He lived there for twelve years and for the rest of the time he was with his family, has been living on this Island. He left a wife and eight children to mourn his loss, seven daughters and one son. The seven daughters are Mrs. William J. Markham, a teacher at the Kaulani School, Mrs. Johnny K. Simonson, Mrs. Lang Akana, Mrs. Thomas D. Crockett, a teacher at the Waipahu School, Miss Jennie K. Stewart, a teacher at the Kapapa School, Kaulani and the Misses Besse and May Stewart, students at the Territorial Normal School.

His only son is Harry K. Stewart with Ripley & Davis, architects. He also leaves several grandchildren on Oahu, a sister, Mrs. Helen Carman, residing in Los Gatos, California, nieces and nephews in San Francisco, Los Gatos, British Columbia, and New York. He was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada.

Funeral took place Wednesday afternoon from Silva's Undertaking parlors.

His daughter, Jennie, was away from his bedside at the time of his death. She will arrive Wednesday morning.

Interment will be in the Nuuanu cemetery.—Mr. C. A. Stewart was a brother of the late Mr. W. H. Stewart, of the old “London House,” Charlottetown.

ROOT MISSIONS IS NOW OPTIMISTIC

MOSCOW—The Root mission left Moscow for Petrograd tonight with a distinct sense of encouragement. After their conference, with leaders of industrial and political life in Moscow, Mr. Root and his associates are disposed to view the Russian situation with greater optimism. The different political atmosphere of Moscow, marked cordiality of their welcome and the ready response representative of all classes to the appeals by Mr. Root have established the fact that the Root mission has a distinctly national viewpoint of Moscow and that of the Root mission there is no important difference as regards conduct of the war.

MEETING PRINCE COUNTY HOSPITAL

The annual meeting of the Prince County Hospital was held in the Court Room of the Civic Building, Summerside, on Tuesday evening, June 26th, at which a number of representative citizens, ladies and gentlemen were present. After reading the adopting the minutes of the meeting held on the 26th day of June, 1916, the following report of the trustees was submitted and read, viz:—

Report of the Trustees of the Prince County Hospital for the year ending May 31st, 1917. “The trustees of the Prince County Hospital beg to submit this their fifth annual report. The general work of the Hospital has been carried on satisfactorily during the year. We had 160 male patients and 168 female patients, a total during the year of 328, 256 of which paying, and 72 free. Of these 161 were residents of the Town of Summerside, 218 from the country districts and nine from other provinces. 266 were discharged cured, 29 improved, 10 died, 3 no improvement, 9 not treated, and 10 under treatment at date.

During the year the trustees have held twelve regular meetings, three special meetings with an average attendance of nine at each meeting.

Our financial condition as will be seen by the detailed statement of Revenue and Expenditure herewith submitted is, thanks to a generous public and the very excellent and energetic management of our esteemed matron, Miss Ross, fairly good. Our endowment fund has been increased to the extent of \$500.00 by a donation from Hon. Senator Yeo, and now amounts to the sum of \$2700.00 as per statement attached.

The Hospital now has beds in public ward nine, beds in private rooms nine, beds in semi private rooms two, beds in maternity ward, four cots six; a total of thirty. During the year one room has been furnished by Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Crosby in memory of their sister, Mrs. Wigham.

The trustees desire to again record their appreciation of the valuable assistance rendered by the Ladies Aid Society and to thank the Medical Staff, the collectors and subscribers in town and country for their services.

From the above you will note that we have a small credit balance as between receipts and payments. This however is due to the hearty response of a generous public to the appeal for funds made by the trustees throughout the year and from which I the sum of \$1519.71 was received. Without this amount we should have a deficit of \$1084.17. The Hospital is not yet we regret to say, self-supporting, and owing to the increased cost of food, fuel and other necessities, a proportionately increased contribution from the public will be required this year in order to make Revenue and Expenditure meet, and as in the past so in the future, we hope to have the hearty support of the public in properly maintaining this worthy institution.

In conclusion we would beg to direct the attention of a generous public to the great importance of increasing the endowment fund, as upon this fund the future financial welfare of this institution will largely depend. Submitted on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

The annual meeting was held in July last at the residence of Mrs. H. H. Beer, Summerside.

The officers elected were:—President, Mrs. H. H. Beer, Vice President Mrs. Hensley, Mrs. Ramsay, Mrs. White, Mrs. McNeill, Mrs. Bell, Miss Schurman and Mrs. Gallant, Treasurer, Miss Mary Hunt, Secretary, Mrs. Nell McQuarrie.

There were nine regular meetings held during the year.

The society held a moonlight excursion on the S. S. Northumberland as a financial aid to the Hospital from which a nice little sum was realized. A most encouraging donation of \$100.00 was received from Mr. W. P. Hunt of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Montreal.

The Society again in the past year in September and March sold tags with the usual good luck.

A high tea was held held in Epworth Hall, January, 1917 with satisfactory results. Also the proceeds of a lecture given by Dr. Ross and the collections at the Nurses Graduation exercises proved quite a financial success.

“Egg Day” this year too brought encouraging results.

During the year the Society had the Living Room of the Lady Superintendent furnished and a fire place and other improvements made therein, also certain other rooms in the Hospital painted and renovated at considerable cost.

As in former years, the sum of \$30.00 per month was voted and paid over to the Trustees to help defray expenses.

Altogether the year was a very satisfactory one.
