Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The new head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency by the Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon any portion of the land in each of three years immediately preceding the date of the application. The applicant must reside on the land for at least 90 days in each of the three years. A habitable house is required in each year residence is performed in each year.

In certain districts a homestead in good standing may be pre-empted quarter-section along side homestead. Price \$500 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres cultivation. The applicant must be a Canadian citizen or a naturalized citizen. The land may be sold as soon as homestead patent has been obtained.

An settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a pre-empted homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years. Cultivate 50 acres and erect house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

OPERATING ONE HOUR EARLIER

Important Daylight Saving Change of Time at Two a. m. Sunday, March 30th, 1919

All clocks and watches used in operation of Canadian National Railways will at 2 a. m. Sunday, March 30th be advanced one hour. To prevent serious confusion and inconvenience to the public the attention of all concerned is directed to the following conditions resulting from the important change of time.

If cities, towns, villages and other municipal bodies do not change their local time to correspond with the new Railway time all concerned should keep in mind that while trains continue to leave Railway stations on present schedule such schedule will be operated one hour ahead of present local time. Therefore any municipality where local time is not changed to correspond with the new Railway time passengers must reach Railway station ONE HOUR EARLIER than shown in current folders and public time posters.

Where municipal time is changed to correspond with the new Railway time, passengers will not experience difficulty growing out of the change. 4827-4-2ME51.
