TEACHERS

Meet in First Session in Montague

PRESIDENT IN CHAIR.

Committees Appointed and Interesting Papers Read And Discussed.

MORNING SESSION.

First annual meeting of Teachers' Association of Eastern Inspectorate convened yesterday morning. Owing to bad condition of roads not so large an attendance as otherwise would have been.

President Mr. J. E. Jay, Principal of Montague Bridge school, opened the Association by a brief address, after which Mr. G. J. Cormac, I. P. S. read the constitution and bye-laws, which were adopted without discussion.

Mr. Francis Egan read a paper on teaching of English. Children should not be over whelmed with definitions and rules without knowing what they mean. Children should be taught early to write composition, by studying works of standard authors, correcting faulty sentences. Papers were discussed and vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Doyle, seconded by Mr. McCormac, was tendered Mr. Egan.

Teachers' Convention and Educational System by J. Allen McDonald; Object of convention; Elevation of teacher's class powerfully realized; Deficiencies of system; system does not supply professional training. Want of trained teaching. Average length of teachers' term, only five years, how to improve. (1) Normal training, (2) Security of position; (3) Increase of salary.

Adjourned to 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Mr. McDonald's paper was taken up, and discussed largely by the Association. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. McDonald for his paper.

A paper was read by Mr. J. Doyle entitled "Some Defects in our Teaching System." In it he said teachers are endeavouring to do too much, children go to school too young, children take up the higher branches too soon. French is not properly taught. The paper was discussed by Martin McKinnon, Chester McLure, Arthur Campbell, John McPherson, Charles Lannan, J. D. Stewart, Frank Egan and J. Allan McDonald.

A paper was also read by Mr. J. J. McPherson on discipline and he claimed that proper superintendence promotes discipline, good organization promotes discipline, teacher's character affects discipline, punishment should be in accordance with the nature and disposition of the child and the nature of the crime committed.

A Question Box was opened and several questions were asked and answered bearing on school work.

In the evening an entertainment was given in the Hall. Addresses were delivered by Dr. Robertson, Mr. Geo. Inman and others.

The Montague Brass Band was also present.

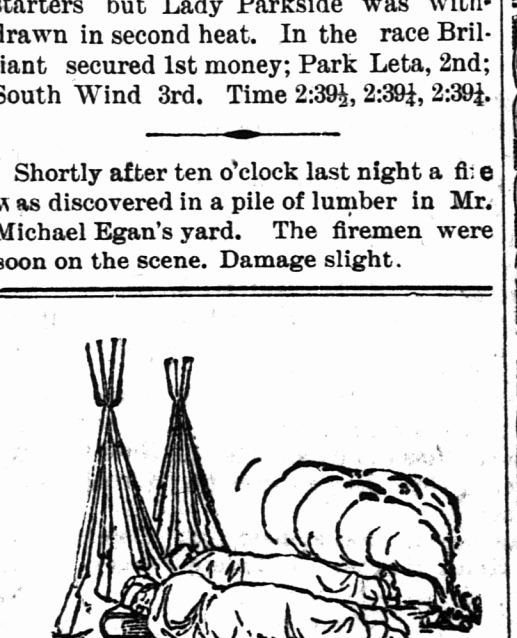
The officers of the track were:
