AMY JOHNSON COMPLETES RECORD HOP

Ten Thousand People Give Intrepid Aviatrice Rousing Welcome At Croyden After Cape Town To England Flight.

CROYDEN AIRPORT, London, Dec. 18.—Amy Johnson landed here at noon today from Paris, completing a flight from Cape Town in the record time of seven days and 11 hours. Ten thousand persons roared themselves hoarse as the intrepid young aviatrice stepped from her plane.

RECORD MAIL CONSIGNMENT

The Orient and Fiji will get a certain amount, but by far the greater portion represents British Christmas presents for distribution in the Dominion.

Will Celebrate Landing Of The Loyalists

DIGBY, N. S., Dec. 18.—(By The Canadian Press)—Seventeen committees were appointed last night by the Digby Board of Trade to look after arrangements for celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Loyalist's landing. The celebration will run from Sunday, June 25, to July 1, and will include special church services, lawn parties, parades, pageantry and sport.

Impressive Services At St. James Church Yesterday. Gift Presented In Memory Of Mr. J. W. Morrison.

During the morning service at St. James Church yesterday morning a chancel rail presented by Mr. A. E. Morrison in memory of his father was dedicated according to the usage of the Church. The rail bears the following inscription:
To The Glory Of God and
To the Memory of J.W. Morrison 1820-1897
Chairman of the Trustees and Building Committee during the erection of this Church
This Chancel Rail is dedicated. The placing in position of the rail completes the scheme of the beautiful chancel erected in memory of Mrs. Goodwill. It is of the same Gothic design and made of the same wood as the remainder of the chancel. The following hymn was sung after the prayer of dedication:
We love the venerable house
Our fathers built to God
In Heaven are kept their grateful vows
Their dust endears the sod.
Mr. J. W. Morrison was one of the leaders in the Kirk at the time when the building was erected. He took a prominent part in the designing and carrying out of the work.
