Grade 'A' drew \$1 per hog present with discounts on off grades.

Bracken Stresses More Realistic View of Struggle

LONDON, March 22 (CP) - The London Daily Mail said editorially today that Prime Minister Churchill's speech last night was "the most important" he has delivered, and termed it "a real charter for the post-war future." "Never before has the people of this country heard a statement of such a conception so vast, so comprehensive, and so stimulating. Here at last is a real charter for the post-war future. The world was shown the structure of a brand new social order to be realized within the time limit of a four-year plan," the Daily Mail said. Diplomatic observers commented that in a sense Mr. Churchill had pictured a new democracy coming without idle promises either at the top or the bottom, with equality of opportunity. The London Times said Mr. Churchill was "less than fair" to those who had considered the time ripe for a broad statement on post-war social policy. The Telegraph, however, said that "until the war is won any attempt in the future to make a statement to take your eye off the ball must be rejected."

Health Insurance First On List of Security Measures

OTTAWA, March 21 (CP) - Health insurance starts first on a list of projected social security measures outlined during the past week in more or less concrete form. The priority picture for the nation's march to the goal of social security was mapped out when a special committee of the House of Commons opened its deliberations became clearer when pensions Minister Mackenzie told the Canadian Press that the government proposes to push right ahead with health insurance, for which draft dominion and provincial legislation has been introduced. The entire field of social security was covered in the March report submitted to the committee. It proposes retirement, disability and widows' pensions, children's allowances, funeral benefits, and unemployment insurance. The government, it is understood, hopes the federal enabling bill on health insurance will pass parliament this session. That would pave the way for the Provincial Legislatures to consider their measures under which the whole plan would operate, at their next sessions and possibly open the way for the whole scheme to come into operation in a period of two years. Negotiations with the provinces on financial arrangements, possibly through the medium of a Dominion-Provincial conference, would be necessary before the whole plan could be settled in detail. Isley Makes Appeal For Co-operation

OTTAWA, March 22 (AP) - Finance Minister Isley today appealed to members of the House of Commons to co-operate with the government in its fiscal program, particularly its anti-inflationary controls. He urged members to cease "piecemeal" attacks on the price ceiling and to refrain from making public statements which might prejudice the fourth victory loan campaign to be launched April 26. Mr. Isley entered the budget debate for a brief speech in which according to John R. MacNeil (Prog. Con. Toronto Davenport) he "scolded the whole opposition." The Minister said he had been "concerned" over some of the speeches made in the House "as to the effect they may possibly have in the House and in the country on our measures of price control and generally on our fight against inflation." The Minister said the government's financial policies were sound. They were the same as those in Britain, the United States and the British Commonwealth countries. "These policies involved heavy taxation, encouragement of saving and borrowing to the limit of what the earners could be induced to save from their incomes. "There are some members of the House who do not believe in that policy," he added, "but I do not think we should ever forget that we are in the throes of a mighty campaign."

King Declined To See Head Of Breweries

OTTAWA, March 22 (CP) - Prime Minister Mackenzie King declined to see E.P. Taylor, president of Canadian Breweries Ltd., in connection with Mr. Taylor's protests against certain restrictions on the sale of beer. It was disclosed in correspondence tabled today in the House of Commons at the request of Rev. A.M. Nicholson (C. P. MacKenzie). In addition to an exchange of letters between Mr. King and Mr. Taylor, the correspondence included letters to the Prime Minister from H.W. Molson, President of Molson's Brewery Ltd., and Norman J. Dawes, President of National Breweries Ltd., disassociating themselves from an advertisement signed by Mr. Taylor, in the Ottawa Journal of Feb. 11. Mr. Taylor's first letter to the Prime Minister was dated Dec. 30, 1942. He said the whole tenor of Mr. King's broadcast speech of Dec. 18 was "unfortunate insofar as it suggested that the Canadian people that they were drinking too much and thus adversely affecting the efforts of the armed services and munitions workers." He suggested Mr. King would have been better to have addressed his message to the few who were intemperate and said that in other nations the moderate use of alcoholic beverages had been given credit for a contribution to the war effort. He asked for an opportunity to discuss the matter with Mr. Taylor but for pressure of public duties.
