AN AMERICAN ON THE EXODUS.

At a dinner in honor of a party of American Newspaper men in the west not very long ago, Elmer E. Critchfield of Chicago said—

"A good many things have been dropped on our way up here which give us from the other side of this imaginary something called a boundary line, occasion to think. People are telling us, or rather a few people have been endeavoring to tell us, that some of our former citizens who decided to cast in their lot with you have become dissatisfied and are flocking back to the States.

"Gentlemen, the people on the other side of the line who really count for anything and who really do things and help to make the big world go round understand the animus behind this declaration. You need not be worried in any particular about this declaration because it is not true. It is not a fact that our people who come over here are going back to the United States. It is not because the people are dissatisfied with you, or with your country, or with your government, or with the administration of your laws, or of the conditions which they find that they are going back. You are all big enough to know that occasionally a man becomes dissatisfied without cause. The disgruntled individual is not going to do you any good if he remains here. Let him go back."

"We have a department of our government whose duty it is to enter and make a complete check on every man who crosses this imaginary line and out of the 758,000 we have gladly contributed you less than 204 of them have come back." (Loud applause).

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 16.—Well-cooked vegetables, rice and meat as opposed to New England mince pie and Boston baked beans has made the "gracious, self-controlled" the superior of the nervous lank New Englander. This was the contention laid down before the Mississippi Valley Medical Association yesterday by Dr. Fenton P. Turck, of Chicago.

150,000,000 OF GOLD FROM THE KLONDIKE IN TWELVE YEARS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The Klondike placer mining district in Alaska has produced \$150,000,000 in gold since 1898 and mining experts estimate the amount yet to be mined will equal that already produced. Consul Cole of Dawson, states that the gold output for 1910 will exceed that of 1909, when more than three and a half millions was produced. Most of this gold, he states, was shipped to the United States. A small quantity went to the new Canadian mint. Consul Cole reports that rich deposits of copper ore have been discovered in the southern part of the Klondike district.

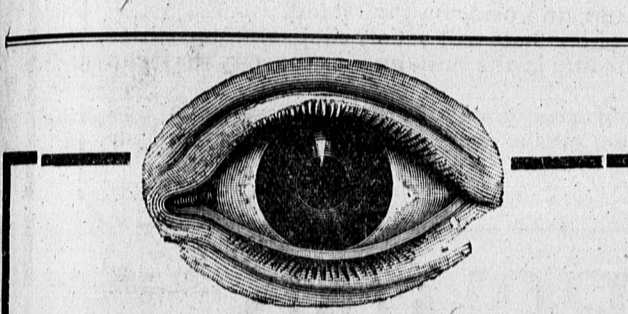
