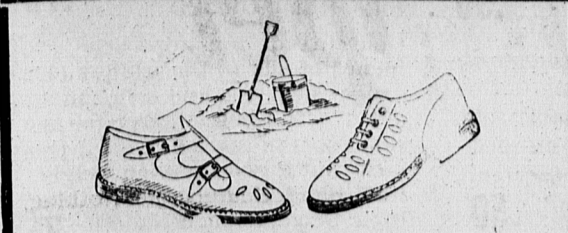

Permanent Cathedral's Commission Is Proposed To Save England's Noted Fanes.

LONDON, May 19. — Far-reaching proposals regarding the English cathedrals are expected to come before the Summer Sessions of the Church Assembly. One is for the appointment of a permanent Cathedral Commission which, with the consent of the 40 to 50 Cathedral bodies, may co-operate in the efficient use and maintenance of the English cathedrals.

Nothing has yet been attempted with respect to the proposals of a Sub-Commission last year for increasing the space in Westminster Abbey for future memorials. It is known, however, that the whole question of additional accommodation at the Abbey is receiving attention. A temporary building may be erected on the north side of the Abbey in order to judge the effect of a permanent addition. Church and architectural authorities, who have studied carefully such a proposal, consider it would not conflict with the features of the Abbey, and generally they approve of the plan.

The Commission, of which the Archbishop of York, Most Rev. Dr. Cosmo Gordon Lang, was chairman, reported last year that the fabric of many cathedrals was in a serious condition, and that within the next few years \$2,500,000 would be required for renovations and repair.

Some large and authoritative appeal was suggested on behalf of the English cathedrals. In the meantime, Church leaders have been impressed by the success which has attended an interesting scheme initiated by the Dean of Canterbury, who has created an organization known as "Friends of Canterbury Cathedral," from whose members generous help is being received.

Under these circumstances a central appeal for \$2,500,000 is now considered unnecessary, though the amount represents the need and encouragement will probably be given to diocesan self-help.

Power From The Sea

PARIS, May 25. — Two French scientists, M. George Claude and Boucheron, have now devised a system for utilizing an inexhaustible store of natural energy which has hitherto remained untapped.

Briefly stated, their discovery is that the difference between the temperature of the surface water and that near the sea-bed in tropical seas provides sufficient power to drive turbines. The discovery was made nearly two years ago, and last year M. Claude exhibited at the Academy of science a small experimental turbine by means of which small difference in temperature furnished the power, the principal being that cold water drawn into a vacuum surrounded by slightly warmer water boiled and gave off steam.

M. Claude, whose theory was regarded with some scepticism when first he explained it, has now proved its truth by installing at Ongrue, near Liege, a small plant which is driving a 50-kilowatt turbine by using a difference of 20 deg. Centigrade between the temperatures of two sources of water.

In tropical seas the surface of the water has a temperature of about 35 deg. Centigrade, while that near the sea-bed is only 4 degs. By using this difference to generate electricity, M. Claude declares that he can distribute at an infinitesimal cost unlimited quantities of power and light.

REVIVAL IN HORSE BREEDING — A great many people are under the impression that horse breeding is confined chiefly to the raising of thoroughbreds for racing purposes. It is true that fewer horses are seen on the streets, but last year there were 3,421,837 horses in Canada valued at \$260,476,000. This simply means that horse breeding is still an industry of great proportions and one that must be considered a national asset.

Horse breeding was almost neglected for some years, but a great improvement has been apparent for some time past, and the finest of all domestic animals is now receiving more serious attention. Better market demands and higher prices have been responsible for the changed attitude on the part of live stock breeders.

Ontario, Quebec and Maritime breeds have experienced a splendid demand for sires, while the farmers of the Prairie Provinces are breeding more mares. The draught breeds are in demand at all seasons particularly for bush and farm work. Saddlers, hunters and polo ponies are sought after, and the best always have ready sale. Quality is the key-note of the demand which is steadily growing in towns and cities, and also in the United States, where Canadian horses have established a splendid reputation for themselves.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture is assisting the horse-breeding industry through its Club policy which enables a community to secure and retain the services of good stallions for a number of years at reasonable fees, and also through the establishing of breeding stations throughout Canada where thoroughbred stallions are kept, and in connection with which annual colt shows are held. These colt shows are serving to encourage the breeding, developing and showing of good horses; they also prove the propinquity of thoroughbred blood. The Federal Club policy is doing much to establish a definite type, and to grade up the horses of a district by requiring a club to adhere to one breed.
