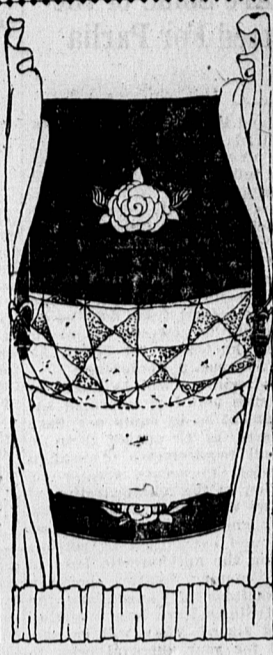

**CNRA Broadcasting Received in London**

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 5 — Remarkable success attended the efforts of the Canadian National Railways Broadcasting Station C. N. R. A. at Moncton to transmit a complete concert to Great Britain last night. A large number of cables were received in Moncton from residents of the British Isles stating that the concert had been received and enjoyed. William Phillips, European Manager of the Canadian National Railways cabled that his office in London had received several hundred telegrams from every part of England and some cities in Scotland, reporting clear reception of the programme and expressing appreciation of its calibre.

Curiously enough the only city which appeared to have difficulty in hearing the broadcast was London. Only snatches of the programme were received there and explanation is offered by officers of the British broadcasting company that the failure was due to oscillation caused by large numbers of set owners attempting to tune in at the same time.

Liverpool, Manchester and Glasgow are among the cities reporting by cable clear reception of the programme. A Professor Finlay, living in the county of Hampshire where the Canadian Military camp of Bramshot was located during the war, cabled Moncton that he had received the concert in sufficient strength to allow it to be reproduced in full on his loud speaker from seven minutes past eleven until one o'clock Greenwich time. In some cases the concert was reported as coming in faint prior to midnight, but after that hour the broadcast was received very clearly in all points in the British Isles that have been heard from.

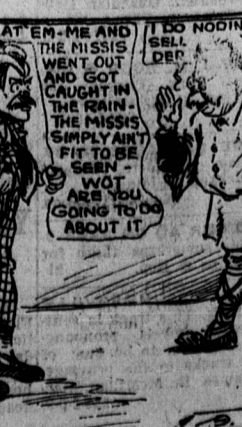
