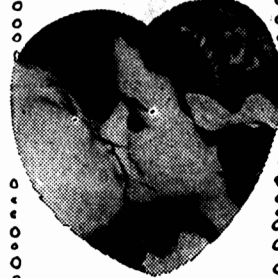

She succeeds Miss Wilma Tait of Toronto, editor of the Canadian Home Journal, who was made honorary president of the Association. Elections of the national executive followed the four-day convention which brought newspaperwomen and radio and free-lance writers from both Canada and the United States to this border city. Highlight of the conference was the visit of Viscount Alexander of Canada's Governor-General, who addressed the club members at their closing banquet. Gaelic Federation Meets At Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, July 1 (CP)—The fifth annual convention of the Federation of Gaelic and Highland Societies in Canada opened Saturday. It is the first to be held in Western Canada. President J. T. Mitchell of Winnipeg, told the delegates that three new societies had been added to the federation this year, making a total of nine across the country. He said that the basis had been laid for a fund to promote the teaching of Gaelic language, songs, dances and piping in Canada. Telegrams of regret at being unable to attend were read from Veterans Minister Mackenzie and Premier Angus MacDonald of Nova Scotia.

The Experts Say

OTTAWA, June 28 (CP)—Canadian home-makers who are rising to the present famine emergency and going their utmost to conserve food, are advised to eat wheat, meat, eggs and cheese as the freshest vegetables now on the market a special asset in meal planning. Reduced helpings of meat, cheese, and eggs are not no longer a large helpings of well cooked vegetables are served. Less bread is eaten and more fruit is used. New potatoes, green peas, string beans, baby carrots and other vegetables served when they are in season in the garden will make beautiful as well as appetizing vegetable plates with no meat at all. The colors are so bright and the texture so delicate it does not matter which are used together. Cook in a small amount of water and for the shortest time, is the advice of the Agriculture Department Consumer Section. To be at their best, the new vegetables should be tender and crisp, the mixture of plain boiled vegetables are delicious but sometimes a special touch is required by steaming or baking one of those used on the vegetable plate. A meat in a dish made with a combination of vegetables is a time-saver and equally good. Creamed new vegetables and potato crisps are one of them. Use the last of the old potatoes for the sauce. Use new potatoes when available. The recipe for Creamed Vegetables in Potato Crust follows. This requires one egg, three cups of well-seasoned mashed potatoes, one tablespoon of milk. Add to the potatoes, mix remaining egg into the potatoes. Spread mixture on a greased pan, making it about a half inch thick. Crimp the edge and prick the bottom with a fork. Bake in a very hot oven 425 to 450 degrees Fahrenheit, until golden brown, about 15 minutes. Remove from the oven, fill with creamed vegetables using one cup of cream sauce and serve hot. This makes six servings.

FREEZING STRAWBERRIES Choose firm, fully ripe berries. Wash, sort, hull. Slice or leave whole, and pack in containers. For dry pack allow one pound (2 cups) sugar for each four (2 cups) prepared strawberries. Sift the sugar over the berries in alternate layers in containers. Fill containers leaving half an inch headspace. For wet pack place berries in container and cover with medium syrup made by dissolving one cup of sugar in one cup of warm water. Chill syrup before using. This amount of syrup is sufficient to fill two to three pint containers.

TAKE 2 LIVING AND HOW TO FREEZE STRAWBERRIES Cold storage locker plants are sprouting everywhere like mushrooms. Home freezing units are also being used. Many people own these freezers, and there are still many places where there are no cold storage locker plants. Most people have heard of this method of food preservation and want to know more about it. Owners of large fruit and vegetable gardens are particularly interested. Proof of the growing interest of people toward frozen foods is requested everyday by the Consumer Section of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. It is with this thought in mind that the following information is being published. The information is practically the same as that used commercially but on a smaller scale and the results obtained are very similar. The newly revised bulletin, FREEZING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES, published by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, contains the latest information on how to freeze. Directions are simple and specific, and will give excellent results to the home-maker freezing food for the first time, as well as to those more experienced at this method of food preservation. This bulletin is based on actual experimental work carried on by the home economists of the Consumer Section. The methods advocated are those which were found to give the best results among the numerous recommendations tried out. Free copies of FREEZING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES may be obtained by writing to the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. Containers for freezing may include heavily waxed cylindrical cartons with slip-over or slip-in lids, plastic-lined tin liners, honey or jam tins, (except for rhubarb) or glass sealers, particularly those with wide mouths. In freezing, selection of fruits and vegetables is most important. Only the highest quality, picked at the right stage of maturity, that is, those at the perfect stage for table use, should be chosen. Variety is also important, as all varieties of every fruit or vegetable do not give equal good results. It is recommended that those interested check with their local Provincial
