## Medwick Has Won His Way Back Into The Good Graces of Dodgers

### Indians Win First Game From Bosox

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—(Muscles) Medwick has won his way back into the good graces of the Brooklyn Dodgers by that 322 batting average he was sporting today.

The official family of the National League champions was decidedly cool toward the veteran slugger in the spring and it freely forecast that Medwick would not even be a regular in the fall season, he probably would not even be with the club.

The fellow who was a star fielder for St. Louis Cardinals in 1940 before being traded to the Dodgers in 1941 apparently not recovered from his beating by Bob Bowman soon after coming to Brooklyn.

The fact that he batted .318 in his helplessness against the Yankees in the spring was a handed pitcher generally by the sidearmers and there was a notable oversight in this regard. Manager Leo Durocher, many years before being a manager friend in or out of the ball, even when they were on the same team.

Because most of the Dodgers' hitting is left-handed, the left-handed hitters are left-handed. Peter Reiser, Dick Camilli, Peter Reiser, Arky Vaughan and Dixie Walker opponents have been using some paws against them at every opportunity. This persistent policy made the batting average of the mill, last year's league leaders runs and runs batted in to almost 200.

But it has helped the right-handed Medwick attain a .318 batting average and given him the confidence at the plate. He had to face few, if any, lefties this season but he has done fine at every high-head pitch by right-hander and as long as he is feeding the Dodgers on a regular basis, he is sure to be a vital force in the line. In addition he is slumped down to playing well and many a spectacular hitting plays.

### Brooklyn Dodgers Scuttle Pittsburgh Pirates 17-2 With A 20-Hit Barrage

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers went on a rampage today to scuttle the Pirates 17-2 at Pittsburgh with a 20-hit barrage. Rookie Les Webber held the Buccaners to five safeties.

It was the 10th straight setback for the Pirates and their 16th in 18 games extending back to May 14 when they cruised into Brooklyn as a challenger second-place club and dropped a three-game series.

Pete Reiser made five consecutive hits—a home run, three doubles and a single—but suffered a slight injury to his left ankle while sliding into the plate in the seventh inning and retired from the contest without getting a chance at the modern major league record of six hits in succession in one game.

McGraw, who died Feb. 25, 1934, bought, sold and traded more players than any other manager in the history of baseball.

### Island Airman Helps In Big Raid On Essen

LONDON, June 2 (CP Cable)—Hundreds of Canadians played a key part in last night's second devastating aerial raid over the Ruhr in three days.

It was learned officially that Canadian pilots were at the controls of huge four-engined Stirlings, Lancasters and Halifaxes, and the lighter Wellingtons and Hampdens, loaded with the great export of high explosives and incendiaries Britain is sending Germany.

Four distinctly R.C.A.F. squadrons were in action with bombers, one only recently equipped with heavy four-engined machines. These were the squadrons which were out on Saturday blasting Cologne, and were commanded by Wing Cmdrs. Johnny Fauquier, Ottawa, A.C.P. Clayton, Vancouver, Johnny Fulton, Kamloops, B. C. and D.A.R. Bradshaw, London, Ont.

In addition to these squadrons, it was authoritatively learned that many more Canadians flew in R. A. F. squadrons.

Prior to the smash at the Ruhr, Canadian-manned fighters participated in R. A. F. trans-channel sweeps, escorted Boston bombers to targets in enemy-occupied territory and later helped clear a path for the returning bombers by patrolling enemy airbases whence interceptor fighters rise.

Among the fighter squadrons active in the continuous sweeps were those commanded by Sqdn. Ldrs. A. C. Douglas, E. Morrow, L. A. Deere and R. B. Newton.

Typical of the many Canadians scattered through the R. A. F. who participated in Saturday's and last night's attacks were 17 officers and sergeants in the Lancaster squadron which raided Augsburg May 17.

Included were Flt. Lt. A. E. Nickerson, Sackville, N.B.; Sgt. H. W. Keane, Quebec and Sgt. V. R. Long, Charlottetown.
