Propose Policy To Improve Trout Fishing

The following are the recommendations prepared by the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protective Association to provide information for a more detailed study of trout fishing facilities and conditions on Prince Edward Island and presented to the Provincial Government.
1. The general objective is the improvement of trout fishing on Prince Edward Island.
(a) As an immediate objective we recommend that a survey of available locations in each County be carried out by qualified men to ascertain actual existing conditions and to determine the most suitable sites for development.
(b) As a long range objective we recommend the immediate setting up of a comprehensive 10 year plan which will lead to the eventual improvement of these areas found most suitable by the survey.

2. The Problems Involved. Poor fishing conditions on Prince Edward Island are due to the following:
(a) It is believed that many waters of Prince Edward Island have insufficient food to sustain the trout population which could exist under normal conditions.
(b) It is believed that many waters in Prince Edward Island contain more fish than the area can sustain, therefore they contain an excessive population of small trout.
(c) Inadequate water in streams. Due to many factors, the chief of which are deforestation, improper farm cultivation methods and lack of stream improvements, the majority of our streams and many of our ponds have not sufficient depth of water to provide for the trout population with the necessary shelter and cool pools for hiding areas.
(d) Loss of dams and mill ponds. It is estimated that upwards of 100 mill dams throughout the Province have deteriorated and gone out partially or completely and as a consequence many hundreds of acres of former fishing areas have been lost.
(e) Protection and Netting. Due to improper methods of fishing, the chief of which is illegal netting, a great number of the larger sized trout are taken from our streams annually.

3. Immediate program recommended for improvement of fishing conditions.
(a) We recommend, as a result of the survey, one pond or stream in each county be selected immediately for improvement and opened to public fishing.
(b) We recommend the establishment of a policy whereby certain pond owners will be provided assistance to repair or rebuild their dams, procure boats, stock, fertilizer and sustain other improvements deemed necessary, in return for public fishing in their ponds or streams for a term of years. The pond owners in return for the fishing rights should be permitted to charge and collect fees for the use of boats or fishing privilege at set rates to be established by the Government.
(c) We recommend that such ponds would be operated under a proper system of fish crop management and harvesting.
(d) We recommend that a program be established to undertake the propagation of live natural food for the purpose of feeding fishing areas.
(e) We recommend that stream improvement work be commenced at the earliest possible date.
(f) We recommend that the present open season dates be given careful study by competent authorities with a view to establishing an open season best suited to the existing conditions.
(g) Whereas the success of this program would be of immense value to the tourist industry, we recommend that the Government set aside from the tourist appropriations certain funds to assist this work. We further recommend that the Travel Bureau encourage owners of fishing areas to establish properly conducted tourist accommodations.

Bouchard, Mosdell Sign With Canadiens

MONTREAL, Sept. 13 (CP)—General manager Frank Selke of Montreal Canadiens announced tonight that defencemen Butch Bouchard and centre Kenny Mosdell have signed their contracts for the 1948-49 season. Bouchard, an outstanding defenceman of the league, will be starting his eighth season with the club. Last year he had four goals and six assists. His best year was the 1944-45 season when he racked up 11 goals and 23 assists. Mosdell played in only 23 games last season. He was out at the start with a broken arm, suffered in a softball game, and later broke the same arm playing hockey.

American Horse Wins St. Leger

DONCASTER, England, Sept. 13 (AP)—American-bred Black Tarquin staged a storming victory Saturday to capture Britain's richest racing prize, the classic St. Leger Stakes, for owner William Woodward of New York. Jockey Edgar Britt boosted the Yank flyer, a 15 to 1-2 third choice, home first by 1 1/2 lengths over the international field of 14 to pick up £15,368 (\$61,472). Lord Derby's Alton was second at the end of the grind of a mile, six furlongs and 132 yards, with Solar Slipper third. The French-bred favorite and Derby winner, My Love, was a well-beaten sixth in the last of the season's three-year-old classics. Black Tarquin's triumph made it a black day for English racing in every department. Britt is an Australian and the brown colt's trainer is Capt. Cecil Boyd-Rochfort, an Irishman, who trains at Newmarket.

New Motorcycle Speed Record

WENDOVER, Utah, Sept. 13 (AP)—Roland Free, a Holly-wood service technician, rode a British-built machine at 150.555 miles an hour today to set a world's motorcycle speed record. Free, 47, sent his two-cylinder cycle roaring along the salt Bonneville salt flats course, a year ago by John Cobb of London to set a world's land speed record of 394.196 miles an hour. The Californian rode his machine through the outboard, measured mile in 24 seconds, then finished his record-breaking performance with a 23.90-second northbound spin. The set record was 136.18 miles an hour, set by Joe Petrali at Daytona Beach, Fla., in 1924.

Plan Ready To Select New Champion

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13 (AP)—The National Boxing Association has a plan for selecting the successor to Joe Louis — if and when the heavyweight champion retires. Abe J. Greene, president of the N. B. A., told a reporter today his group was prepared to recognize the winner of an elimination tournament — between Jersey Joe Walcott, Gus Lesnevich, Jimmy Bivins and Essad Charlas — as the new heavyweight king if the Brown Bomber officially calls it quits. But Greene emphasized, "we will not force Louis to resign. "We will do nothing that might reflect unfavorably on Louis, great champion that he is." Greene, in an interview after the opening session of the N. B. A.'s 29th annual convention here, said Louis still had until December to make up his mind and that the N. B. A. was "certain" the champion would act by that time. The tipoff may come tomorrow night. As N. B. A. officers made their official reports it was apparent that some 150 boxing delegates from 44 states, two United States territories and two foreign countries were merely marking time for Louis' arrival. The champion is scheduled to attend the N. B. A. dinner meeting here tomorrow night. He may make known whether he plans to keep the retirement pledge made to his mother immediately following the Walcott fight. While Louis has insisted he'll quit the ring as undefeated heavyweight champion of the world, there have been repeated rumors the Brown Bomber might make one more defence of the title he has held longer than any other fighter.

Rechon Eliminated For U.S. Tennis Title

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 13 (CP)— Henri Rochon, Canada's Davis Cup player from Montreal, today was eliminated in the second round of the United States tennis championships. He fell victim to Clarence (Nick) Carter of San Francisco, 6-3, 7-3, 6-0. Rochon, the last Canadian survivor in the tournament, kept pace for the first six games of the first set before Carter took three in a row. In the second set, Carter broke Rochon's service in the 12th game and then ran out the final games, dropping only seven points.

Browns Deal Blow To Indians' Pennant Hopes

CLEVELAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—The sixth-place St. Louis Browns dealt a sharp blow to Cleveland Indians' pennant hopes today by grabbing a 3-2 victory on pinch-hitter Joe Schultz's ninth-inning single after two Tribe infield errors had helped to fill the bases. The smallest crowd of the season, 7,008 fans, watched glumly as the Browns tied up the score at 2-2 in the eighth and went on to win, battering through four Indians hurlers in the final two frames. It was the only American League game scheduled. The defeat ended a Cleveland winning string of seven games and sent the home club a chance to gain on the idle Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees. The Tribe is now three games back of Boston and a game behind New York.

Opening Ceremonies

Yesterday's ceremonies opened at 10 a.m. with the celebration of Solemn High Mass in St. Anne's Church, by the pastor the Rev. E. W. McInnis. Rev. J. D. Kelly, Missions, was Deacon and the Rev. Leonard McDonald, Wellington, sub-Deacon of the Mass. The Rev. H. S. Wright, Summerside, acted as Master of Ceremonies. Present at the Sanctuary were His Excellency Bishop Boyle, Rev. Bennett McDonald, St. George's, and the Rev. J. W. McCordie, Charlottetown. In his sermon, Bishop Boyle paid a warm tribute to the great work done on Lennox Island by Mrs. John Sark, widow of the late Chief John Sark. In coming as a young English girl to Lennox Island 30 years ago where her environment was so completely foreign to that of her native England, Mrs. Sark had shown qualities of heroism and character possessed to such a degree by few women. Looking back along the years, Mrs. Sark could now say that her sacrifice of ease and the pleasures of her former life had not been in vain. She was now the mother of two Sisters of the Order of St. Martha and of a son whose academic attainments were much above the average and who, His Excellency felt sure, would give his mother cause for legitimate pride in the days to come. Mrs. Sark, His Excellency said, had been a means of inspiration to the Indians of Lennox Island and no man could overestimate the benefit which her example had been to those people. His Excellency congratulated all those who had had any part in the construction of the new buildings and said that the thanks of the whole Parish of St. Anne's was due to the Dominion Government for its launching of the project. His Excellency expressed the belief that the Sisters of St. Martha would at Lennox Island live up to their splendid reputation for noble ministrations to these in need of help and that the duties of parish priest would be eminently carried out by the new pastor, the Rev. Federal Assistance

Mr. J. E. Morris said his department intended to give the Indians at Lennox Island every aid to enable them to become more independent in their struggle for a livelihood. Already the Department had placed a pure bred Ayshire bull on the island to improve the quality of the cattle there. At present there were eight milking cows on the island and 16 goats. The Department had also planted 100 apple trees on the island and would plant 100 more. Day-old chicks had been also placed on the island as well as some 250 strawberry plants. All these importations were being looked after by competent persons and the number of trees, strawberry plants, etc., would be increased according as the Indians showed themselves competent of profiting by them. The community store, Mr. Morris said, would sell all the commodities usually found in a general store, to the Indians and whatever profit was made would be turned back to them in the form of community benefits. The erection of a permanent residence for the Indian agent, Mr. L. J. Daly, had filled a long-felt want and now Mr. Daly, an unusually competent and sincere official,

Chief Interviewed

Chief Jadis informed a representative of The Guardian that the population of Lennox Island fifty years ago had been at least 500. The whole island had been practically covered with tepees in those days, he said, and only two or three lived in houses. Since there was no great inducement for such a large number to remain cooped up on one small island, many of them had moved some days ago, R.C.M.P. said.
