Harness Racing Season Ushered In At S'Side; 3,000 See Close Events

Despite very threatening weather and showers in the western part of the Province nearly all morning, with the skies clearing around 1 o'clock, great throngs of people made their way to the Summerside Driving Park track. At 3 o'clock over 3,000 people were seated on the grandstand, or in cars or were on foot witnessing the races.

Highlights of the day were the first appearance in the role of driver of veteran horseman and driver, George Hooper of Charlottetown and the debut as reinsman of two youths, under 18, Joe Hennessey and driver of Dale H. 206 and Don Seaman who piloted Johnny Egar to victory and a new record. Both received unstinted applause on their performances.

Another highlight was the presence on the track of other horses that had performed brilliantly for other owners by the United States. Happy L. 203 1-2 campaigned by Earl Avery for Vic Holdaway of Houlton, Maine, Dale H. 206 and Reginald, 209 1-2, imported to Charlottetown by Walter Hennessey from S. A. Wathen and Son, Fort Fairfield, Maine.

The newcomers lived up to the splendid reputations which had preceded them. Altogether the racing was good and was closely and enthusiastically watched by the large concourse of people.

Following is a brief account of the races:

Free-for-All
After a lot of scoring the first heat got away to a fine start. Happy L stepped right to the front and held the lead to the finish. Dale H was second until the last 200 yards when he made a wobble and was passed by Hal McKinney and Uscita Britton. McKinney was unsteady in this heat and finished last.

Second Heat: They got away to a good start after a few scores. Happy L made every point a winning one. Dale H rushed from fourth to second in the last quarter, heading Jean Henley nicely through the stretch. Uscita Britton finished third and Hal McKinney made a bad break going away and lost a lot of ground.

Third heat: Uscita Britton grabbed the lead before the quarter was reached with Happy L tucked in behind and Dale H in third place with Jean Henley fourth. Dale H and Jean Henley started sprinting in the stretch. Uscita Britton finished first, Hal McKinney second and Happy L third. Uscita Britton back half a length and Hal McKinney fifth.

LEESBURG, Va., July 1—(AP)—Zev, Kentucky Derby winner in 1925 and one of the great thoroughbreds of the American turf, is dead at the age of 23. His end came last week on the quiet acres of Belmont, Brig-Gen. Patrick J. Hurley's estate, to which he was taken three years ago to graze his remaining days in peace. Zev is remembered by racing fans as winner of the greatest international match race in American history, when he defeated Papyrus, English champion and winner of the 1923 Epsom Derby.

His book, "Bridgehead to Victory" (Doubleday, Doran) is issued in Canada a fortnight after publication in the United States. Mr. Randall writes not only as a military student but as an expert on the geography and the peoples of Europe. His compact (183 pages) thesis is at the same time authoritative and intelligible to the non-military reader.

Sequence of Attacks

Sequence of attacks on the Randall schedule:—
Russia - Either in the south (toward Kiev and Dnepropetrovsk) or the north (toward Eskov and Vitelsk) using the brilliant alternating Russian technique of last winter's battle.

Mediterranean - (Two weeks later) feint operations in the west with small commando raids in Sicily and Sardinia. Followed two or three days later by the main operations: strong attacks on the toe and heel of Italy and on Corfu and Zante; islands off the west coast of Greece, with diverting commando raids against Crete.

Scandinavia - (Same time as Mediterranean) diverting operations in the form of strong commando raids.

Western Front - (One week later, synchronized with strong new Russian attacks) diverting commando attacks on southern France; feint attack on Holland with strong air support. Main attack on Normandy - Brittany.

Germany (same time) Large-scale parachute and guerrilla - troop operations against key cities.

Canadian troops in England would see with interest the author's breakdown of the cross-channel main attack on the two peninsulas of Normandy and Brittany. Normandy (due south of Portsmouth) would be nipped off and converted into a powerful operational base after simultaneous attacks from both sides of the peninsula with heavy air attacks and ample use of airborne troops. Brittany (east of the channel from Land's End) would be more difficult to seize because of its greater distance from England. The author says: "It is very possible that the first attack against the Normandy and Brittany coasts will not be successful and will be choked before they can really develop. . . . If such an attack, attempted in all its details, did not lead to the establishing of bridgeheads within two or three days, and a few more days for the cutting off of the Normandy peninsula from the mainland, it is doubtful whether the attempt could ever be repeated with much more chance for success, except if in the meantime the allies succeeded in completely destroying the German air force. But such an attack even if successful, would not be in vain, as it would relieve the main front to such a degree that the chances for decisive victories in Russia would be infinitely better than ever before."

100,000 for Bridgehead

Concentration of 100,000 troops on a relatively narrow sector would not be an excessively large number for establishing a bridgehead, the author says, emphasizing that several thousand small vessels would be required. Large vessels could not be risked. And all vessels used for a large-scale seaborne attack "would have to be written off completely." He counsels against any comparison with a small-scale short-distance one-day "show" like Dieppe.

Discusses Dieppe

Of the Dieppe operation in which Canadians participated last August, Mr. Randall says: "We must assume that the brilliant raid against Dieppe had strategic reasons that have not been made public other than simply reconnaissance and the destruction of certain installations. These two objectives alone would not have justified the British troops merely showing what they could do. . . . The Germans learned a more important lesson from this raid than did the British troops who expected a maximum of resistance and preparation. . . .
