Bruins Trade Portland For Des Smith

BOSTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—Without waiting for the shock caused by the Eddie Shore trade to subside, Boston Bruins hockey management announced tonight it had traded Jack Portland, 200-pound defenseman to Chicago Black Hawks for Des Smith, also a rear guardman. According to President Weston Adams of the Bruins no cash was involved in the deal. Portland, who teamed with Shore during most of the three previous seasons with the Bruins, was ordered to report to the Chicago club in time for tonight's game at Detroit. Smith, along with Eddie Wiseman, obtained from New York Americans for Shore will play for the Bruins in Detroit Sunday night.

Have Big Margin In Play In Last Two Periods After Visitors Have Edge In First

A fast-skating, tireless St. Dunstan's University team last night started off the western section of the Intercollegiate Hockey League in an auspicious manner as they sent a visiting St. Thomas University squad from Chatham, New Brunswick tumbling to a 9-3 defeat in a game that at times was drab but on other occasions fairly bristled with red-hot hockey action. Off to a poor start and at times outplayed in the opening session which ended in a 1-all deadlock the Saints "juggernaut" composed of Jack Coyle, Vince Grant and Bert Steele really started to roll in the middle ante; the visitors twice facing a two goal deficit fought back gamely each time to cut their opponents lead in half but they finally wilted before the blazing speed and brilliant passing attacks the trio unworked. Before the second ante had ended the Saints had a 6-3 lead and in the final chucker shot three goals without a return from their opponents.

Local Rinks To Play In Summerside

Six local rinks will journey to Summerside today roads and weather permitting for a friendly series of matches with Summerside it was stated at the Curling Club last night.

There was little to indicate the wide margin the Saints would end up with in the first period as the visitors no doubt tired from their long journey had an edge in the play, but they had to be content with a 1-all deadlock as the session ended. For over fourteen minutes of close checking hockey rival goals turned aside all attempts to have their armor but suddenly St. Thomas broke the deadlock as Goodville snared a puck at the inside the Saints line and worked in unopposed to fire the rubber behind Connolly. The score was a signal for the game to speed up and less than two minutes later Jack Coyle, making the disc through the rubber broke the deadlock to the goal to one side and then whipped a pass across to Vince Grant for the third counter. The storm started to break on the visitors early in the second session. A minute and 38 seconds from the start Grant, conspicuous for his fast-breaking and dashing and brilliant back-checking broke through to the goal; his shot flew high in the air but as it settled on the ice Coyle pounced on it to lob a low drive into the cage. Two minutes later Steele, picking up momentum as the game progressed, made the play for the Saints third counter, speeding to the St. Thomas line Bert sild a pass to Coyle that sent the entrance into the clear; Coyle fished for a mixing goalie and shot the disc into the yawning cage. A defensive lapse on the part of the Saints rear guard gave the visitor their fourth counter, four minutes later, Keoughan, tricky and hard-working centre of the first line sped down the left boards, slipped the puck by a Red and White defender and had a clear road to the net; Connolly hadn't a chance on the ankle-high drive that rustled the cords.
