MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—There was no further change in the condition of the local egg situation yesterday, but prices were very firm for the higher grades on account of the somewhat limited supplies available on spot, and the fact that the percentage of such stock coming forward is very small.

Wholesale jobbing prices were quoted as follows: Selected stock 45c to 46c. No. 1 stock 40c to 41c. No. 2 stock 38c to 39c.

The demand for potatoes for immediate consumption continues good, and the market was fairly active, with a firm undertone owing to the fact that supplies are not more than sufficient to meet the requirements, and sales were made at \$3 to \$3.25 per bag of 80 lbs.

On the square hay sold at \$1.30 to \$1.50 per cwt; straw 50c per cwt; oats 80c to 85c and new potatoes, which were scarce, \$1.50 per bushel.
