Elephant Jaws Under Bank

Workmen excavating for additions to the Bank of Tokyo in Tokyo, Japan, have unearthed the upper and lower jaws and teeth of giant elephants believed to have lived millions of years ago. They were found 31 feet below the surface of the ground. Dr. Juko Tpkunawa, archaeologist of the Wescoda University, declares that the finds are the rarest of their kind. A number of petrified shells also dug up are believed to be 100,000 years old.

PRODUCE

MONTRÉAL, Oct. 5.—Declines which have sent butter prices steadily lower on the Montreal dairy and produce market during the past few days, came to an end today, and a steeper decline prevailed. No 1 grade in carlots or less brought 18 cents a pound as compared with 18 to 18 1/2 cents yesterday. Export business continued disappointing and export prices are still under domestic levels. Receipts today totalled 32 boxes. Eggs were unchanged, graded shipments of Ontario bringing 22 to 23 cents a dozen for extra, 27 cents for firsts and 15 1/2 to 16 cents for seconds, with westerns slightly cheaper than Ontario. Arrivals amounted to 345 cases. The cheese market continued on the easy side, Ontario being quoted mostly at 11 cents and Quebec at 10 1/2. Arrivals totalled 2596 boxes. The potato market was a little easier, increasing arrivals of Maritime stock sending Quebec potato prices off 5 cents a bag. Quebec were quoted at 65 to 70 cents while New Brunswick green mountains brought 75 to 80 cents, per 80 pound bags.

Britain Will

Balance Budget

LONDON, Oct. 4.—(C.P.-A.P. Cable)—Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, tonight told a group of bankers Britain's budget would be balanced this year and bridged the situation in the United Kingdom offered a more favorable prospect than it did a year ago. The Chancellor, speaking at a bankers' dinner at the Mansion House, said he consoled himself for what he had lost in being unable to present the last two years by this thought. The Chancellor said it seemed likely Great Britain ultimately would return to the gold standard. "But," he continued, "we in this country cannot consent to link our currency to gold until we are certain that the conditions prevailing are such as will permit the gold standard to function efficiently." Mr. Chamberlain pointed to a further drop in unemployment figures for September as a favorable sign but said it was urgent that international trade be revived. Britain's exports, he declared, had been halved between 1926 and 1932 and the nation had lost \$365,000,000.
