NEW YORK, July 10 (AP)—The stock market managed to break a little better than even today despite the persistence of irregularity which started last Wednesday.
While many leaders of the recent speedy climb were under water throughout an assortment of specialties, utilities, rubbers, coppers, aircrafts and farm implements overrode selling currents to finish with gains of fractions to around 2 points.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 1.4 of a point at 43.3 or a net of 1.4 points on the week to date. Dealings tapered off substantially, transfers totalling 838,095 shares compared with 1,097,673 Tuesday.

Canadian stocks showed slight gains. Distillers Searom gained 1-4. Dome Mines 1-8, International Nickel 1-8, Canadian Cars 2-16.

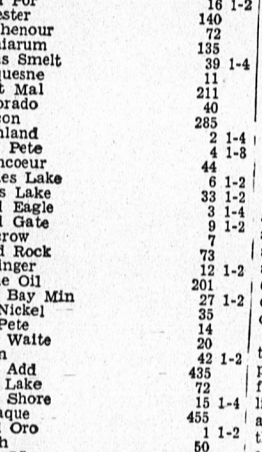
Among shares getting into new high ground for 1941 were Pepsi-Cola, White Rock, Consolidated Aircraft, U.S. Western common and pfd, and Great Western pfd.

On the upside also were Consolidated Edison, North America, American Water Works, Union Carbide Allied Chemical, Anacanda and Kennecott.

Woolworth got back 5-8 of its 2 1-4-point drop yesterday. American Telephone duplicated its 2-point fall of the preceding session.

Losses included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Santa Fe, Great Northern, N.Y. Central, So. Pacific, Westinghouse and Du Pont.

A cheque for \$425 was forwarded to the Fund with the best wishes of the Dairy Pool towards "the very worthwhile work" which the Fund is doing.

In Memoriam

CAPT. J. L. WILLIAMS
On June 12, 1941, at Nanaimo General Hospital, the death occurred of Capt. J. L. Williams, at the age of 55; following an illness of four days.

In 1904 Capt. B. L. Johnson (now Cmdr. B. L. Johnson, R. C. N. R., D. S. O., Naval Officer in command of the Port of Vancouver), went to England to bring the steamer Vado for Boscowitz Co. in England. He was approached by young Jarvis "Llewellyn" Williams, who was given a position on the Vado, they came out via Straits of Malacca, arriving in 1907. Boscowitz Co. later sold out to Union Steamships Co. and Williams stayed with the Vado. He worked his way up to Master in the Fleet.

When the Great War broke out he enlisted with the 29th Battalion and served as Sergeant of the Mortars. In 1919, when the Prince of Wales visited Vancouver he personally decorated Captain Williams with the Meritorious Service Medal.

At the time of his death Captain Williams was resident at Ladysmith, Vancouver Island and Manager of Empire Stevedoring Co. Ltd., interests on the east coast of Vancouver Island from Cowichan Bay to Nanaimo.

He was an active member in community life, local sports and Red Cross especially finding in him a tireless supporter. Generous, warm-hearted and loyal, he was a staunch friend.

He is survived by his wife (formerly Mrs. Margaret MacPhee of Georgetown, Prince Edward Island), a son, Richard, and daughter, Catharine, of Ladysmith, B. C., two brothers and two sisters in Liverpool, England, where he was born.

The funeral took place in Vancouver, from the Cathedral of the Holy Rosary where solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. A. J. MacLellan, assisted by Rev. Lewis MacLellan as Deacon and Rev. A. J. MacLellan as Sub-Deacon—all of the Vancouver Daily Province, came over from Vancouver to officiate.

It was carried to the grave by oldtime comrades and colleagues of the present; the pallbearers being Capt. W. M. Crawford, Capt. J. Macmillan, Peter Blair, Wm. Horton of Empire Stevedoring Co. and C. M. Vick and Wm. Johnson representing the 29th Battalion. Committal Calvary, Ocean View Burial Park, the Vancouver Daily Province, Saturday, June 21, 1941.
