May Hear Axis Peace Offers

NEW YORK, Dec. 18 — (CP) — Germany and Japan soon may make or inspire peace overtures "because of United Nations successes in the Pacific, Russia and in Africa" but the Allies must not be trapped in such a ruse, deceit and a lie, Maj.-Gen. L. R. LaFollette said here today.

In a broadcast address before the Canadian Club of New York, Canada's Minister of National War Services warned his listeners to beware of such overtures, adding that "surely you have learned the lesson of November, 1918—I have." The suffering and death of millions of peaceful men and women has "finally taught us the truth" and, although the United Nations "are still far from victory... We must settle down to winning the war. We have worked hard, the time will soon be here when all must fight hard."

Earliest Stage Of Human Embryo

NEW YORK, Dec. 18 — (AP) — Recovery of a human embryo only 1-2 days old, the earliest stage of human development ever seen, is described today in the annual report of the Carnegie Institution of Washington.

This life-at-beginning specimen was so small it would pass easily through the letter O of small newspaper type. For many, however, was the essential germ portion that would have developed into a child. This germ was two layers of tissue, rolled into a tiny ball. It would have taken seven of these rolls to cover a period on this news page. The ball evidently quickly starts to unroll. It was already unrolled in a 9 1-2-day human embryo, which was also recovered this year and given to the Carnegie biologists for study. In an older human embryo the tissues which would form the head were identifiable as such at 18 1-2 days after conception.

The report says that these two youngest embryos give information about an important period, so far as human species is concerned, has been known only hypothetically. The evidence from the study so far is that human conception on the average follows an almost perfectly patterned time of beginning. The possibility is also indicated that five or six days may elapse after conception before the embryo is in an apparent connection with the mother.

New Anti-Tank Weapon In Use

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 — (AP) — A new tank-destroying weapon, capable of blasting an enemy tank with a single shot, may be hoped to hammer Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's Africa Corps to pieces in a trap on the Libyan coast. Not only is the new weapon destroy a tank, but it could presumably outrun—or at least equal in speed—any enemy tank and at the same time bring to bear great fire power.

Developed in closest secrecy by American ordnance experts, details of such a new weapon still are shrouded in mystery. But it is known that many experiments were pointing toward the mounting of a big field piece on a speedy tank chassis, thus producing a fast-moving and highly manoeuvrable heavy weapon that could stay at the front in swift assault or pursuit.
