**Good Roads Convention**

MONTREAL, Sept. 5.—Acceptances of the invitations sent out to members of the Canadian Good Roads Association and allied organizations to attend the twentieth annual convention of the association at the Royal Connaught Hotel, Hamilton, on September 13, 14 and 15, and reservations for hotel accommodations, are reaching George A. McNamee, the secretary-treasurer, in increasing numbers at his offices in the New Birks Building here, and a gratifyingly large attendance is already assured. The proximity of Toronto and half-a-dozen small cities to Hamilton, and the densely settled and highly-organized county, township and urban municipalities comprised in the territory adjacent to the convention city, should result in swelling the ranks of official and lay delegates well beyond the numbers registered in years when the convention has been held in less central locations or more sparsely-populated provinces. Assurances have been received that governmental delegations, headed by Highway Ministers, their deputies or departmental executives, will be present from Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Manitoba and Saskatchewan, in addition to association officers and members from all the other provinces. Hon. Herbert A. Bruce, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, has been invited to perform the opening ceremony on Wednesday, September 13, and Prime Minister George S. Henry, a past-president of the association, is also expected to be present.

A new and welcome feature of this year's convention will be the presence of a strong representation of the American Road Builders' Association, with which close reciprocal relations have been maintained for years by the Canadian body. On the preceding Saturday at noon a motorcade will leave the A.R.B.A. headquarters at Washington, D.C., and after staying overnight at Williamsport, Pa., and receiving additions en route, will enter Ontario at the Niagara frontier and reach Toronto late on Sunday afternoon. On Tuesday the motorcade will proceed to Hamilton for the duration of the convention. Already some forty members of the A.R.B.A. have signified their intention of joining the motorcade.

Wednesday and Thursday will be taken up with four convention sessions, two lectures at each being followed by discussions, and by the annual business meeting of the association, with the annual dinner concluding the proceedings. Friday will be devoted to an inspection trip of the highways of the Niagara peninsula, taking in Niagara Falls and Queenston, St. Catharines, the new Welland Canal, the Chippewa power development, and the famous fruit belt, and permitting inspection by the technical delegates of various types of highways, with their bridges, culverts, cuttings, fills and other auxiliary works.

**New Combination Meal Service On C.N.R. Trains**

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 4.—The new combination meal service inaugurated on dining cars of the Canadian National Railways is meeting with marked approval on the part of the patrons of the railway in the Maritimes, stated E. W. Cameron, superintendent of sleeping and dining cars at Halifax, N. S., who was in Moncton today on business connected with his department. The new combination meals, Mr. Cameron said, afford the travelling public greater convenience in ordering meals, and this, along with the reasonable rates set, has brought them into favor.

There are five combination breakfasts, ranging in price from 35 cents to one dollar, four luncheons, priced at from 75 cents to one dollar and three dinner selections priced from one dollar to \$1.50.

**Former Islander Receives C.N.R. Appointment**

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 4.—The appointment of John L. Henderson as acting locomotive foreman at Sydney, N. S., effective this date is announced by W. E. Barnes, General Superintendent of Motive Power and Car Equipment, Atlantic Region, Canadian National Railways, in the place of J. A. Johnston, retired.

Mr. Henderson, who is a native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., entered the service of the railway as machinist's apprentice at Sydney on October 27, 1918, serving the necessary length of time to qualify him as a machinist. Severing his connection with the railway, he reentered the service as machinist at Sydney on March 5, 1929 and on June 5, 1929 was made machinist and crane operator which position he continued to occupy until his new appointment.

**EMPLOYS VIOLET RAYS TO TRAP MOSQUITOES**

PARIS, Sept. 5.—A young French woman Mlle. Germaine Gourdon, has just invented a kind of vacuum-cleaning process to relieve the world of all kinds of obnoxious insects.

Her apparatus is a combination lamp emitting ultra-violet rays and a suction-pump which draws into an aspirating chamber all insects which come within the range of the rays. By varying the length of the rays, the operator attracts all varieties into the fatal zone. After an experiment with short rays, the receptacle of the vacuum-cleaner was found to contain a large number of mosquitoes and other small insects. When a greater length was tried many large moths and beetles found their way into the wholesale destroyer.

The principal claim made for the invention is that it enables the operators in infested areas to induce the insects to seek their own destruction. Its most curious feature is its property of selection. Two lamps working with rays of different lengths attract various kinds of insects. Mosquitoes, for instance, were trapped in thousands by a lamp which larger insects ignored.

The prince's head will replace the commonwealth coat-of-arms water-mark. When held up to the light the features of the heir to the throne will be seen facing those of the King.

Another change is that the promise to pay in gold has been deleted.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—Recent wills include that of a man who declared that his wife should not be allowed to attend his funeral or to see him after death.

He stated that his wife "did order me out of her house by telling me to go and go quick, which I did, and by so ordering me out she did forfeit all legal claim to me or anything that I own."
