THE death took place in the City yesterday of Annie Elizabeth Haviland, relict of the late Hon. T. H. Haviland. The late Mrs. Haviland leaves to mourn two sons and two daughters. The sons are Edward H. barrister-at-law, of this City, and Edward of Montreal. The daughters are Mrs. James Peake and Miss Blanche Haviland.

EPWORTH LEAGUE LITERARY EVENING.

The winter season of entertainment, musical and literary, scientific or social, was handsomely inaugurated last evening. No happier choice could be made for a literary evening than Tennyson Professor C. J. McMillan was invited to the responsible position of caterer. He proved to be a most satisfactory chef. Touching lightly on the delicious morceaux many of which are now wedded to music, as, "The Brook," "Break Break Break," "Crossing the Bar," he proceeded to the poet's aim. The lecturer stated Tennyson did not sermonize yet over left the mind attuned to finer susceptibilities to deeper meanings and helpful introspective thought. Following the august lead of his subject, Mr. McMillan did not sermonize. Biography was left for others, criticism for letrates too, the readers sought for beauties, and looking lovingly and knowingly found in his search for wisdom like one of old that his reward was all three, wisdom, power, riches. We had no sermon yet let us recount what we obtained from the hard text, "a tale of hair, a score of scorn and a love of love." We want that honest doubt does not damn, for the greatest minds have in their course gone thru' the depths. We learned that the purposeless life is the least satisfactory, that energy, especially when in self-effacement it seeks to benefit others, is a panacea for grief even to the killing of remorse. We drank in anew that on the stepping stone of our dead selves we might yet rise to noble things. Deftly the lecturer traced his canvas till we saw the meanings of his quotations crystallized into a central figure and before it we bowed and cried with the poet, "More of reverence in us dwell." It is true to say Tennyson is great, banal to say he is good, but it is no mean office to make that greatness, that goodness more clear to us and to leave us with the poet's optimism that we indeed may rise to emulate the goodness and perchance in His eyes to a little of the greatness that attaches to manhood. Thanks Mr. McMillan, when you read a poem may I be there to see, to see clever thought cogently expressed, to take with me as I leave not a little wisdom and, as on this occasion, a deeper insight and love of your theme. Thank, Epworth League, you have set a high standard. The paper by Mrs. Smith, an outline of Tennyson's life and work was a fitting prelude to the paper by Professor McMillan. The two songs contributed by Mrs. Watts and Mrs. Luge were excellently sung and rounded out a delightful evening.

FIRE! About 5 o'clock last evening the dwelling house of Charles Hughes, Cove Road, was discovered to be on fire. Neighbors and friends rushed to the scene and succeeded in saving the furniture and most of the household effects but as the fire had made considerable headway before they arrived were unable to save house. The fire is supposed to have started from a spark from the furnace of the boiling house which was situated close to the dwelling house, and lodging in some bags containing crushed grain from which it spread with great rapidity. The greater part of his root crop was stored in the cellar and it is feared is considerably damaged. The loss is estimated at from \$300 to \$1,000, and is partially covered by insurance.
