The unconventional behaviour of May Day weather was not kind to the meeting of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals held in the Magistrate's Office, City Building last evening, and prevented not only embryo members, but several officers of the executive from being present.

In the absence of the President, Dr. J. S. Jenkins, who by the way was not detained by the weather, and all three Vice-Presidents, Mr. K. J. Martin, Stipendiary, though not a member of the society, consented to act as chairman.

A letter of resignation from the President was read, and it was moved and seconded that his resignation be passed favor, in any case, until the next meeting. The Constitution and Bye-laws, having been drawn up by a committee formed for that purpose at the last meeting, were read by the Chairman, subject to amendment. Practical suggestions for corrections were made by Messrs. Geo. E. Hughes, H. V. Buntain, D. Edgar Shaw, W. A. Gillespie and Dr. Pethick before being adopted. Mrs. J. O. Hyndman spoke of the advisability of encouraging the school children in humane interest and it was suggested that the Society offer a school prize for the best article written on kindness to animals.

A motion was made that two members of the executive should investigate a certain place in the country about which there have been shocking complaints. This was carried unanimously and it is believed that before long the S. P. C. A. will let its influence be felt in the province.

On motion the society adjourned until Monday, June 1st at the same hour and place.

## Budget Debate

ely \$262,000,000. This, he pointed out did not include a further indebtedness of \$18,000,000 for our railways since the end of last year. The increase in debt of the Canadian National Railway, he stated, was colossal.

**Marler Interrupts**  
During Mr. Meighen's analysis of the public debt, Herbert Marler, of St. Lawrence St. George, interrupted to say that the addition to the public debt in the last three years of all accounts was only \$111,000,000 and not \$262,000,000 as claimed by Mr. Meighen. The leader of the Opposition recommended Mr. Marler to go into the subject again to use a little more investigation "and to have less determination to get back into the good graces of the government."

**Less Immigrants at Greater Expense.**  
Mr. Meighen deplored the increase in the expenditure of the Canadian National Railways. This department, he said, duplicated the efforts of the immigration department. With all the increase in expenditure, thirty-seven thousand less immigrants were secured for Canada last year than in the year before. Regarding the policy of the government, Mr. Meighen said that by actual count this government had announced nine different policies in three years and "they are all wrong."

**Premier King at this point charged the figures Mr. Meighen was quoting. The latter said that his secretary had secured them from the immigration department and if they were wrong that department was to blame.**

**To Find Out Where Progressives Stand**  
In conclusion, Mr. Meighen said that the government substituted excuses and promises of revival of trade for any concrete policy which would extricate Canada from its " mire of debt." The Drayton amendment asked for a reduction in taxes particularly of those taxes which bore directly on the average citizen. There was not one progressive member in the House who had not advocated the same thing for the amendment. In previous years they had said that they agreed with the Conservative policy on most points but they could not stand protection. Well, there was J. McKinnon, Mrs. Frank Hanco protection in this amendment. The Conservative party had its own views about protection and would stand by them. But this time the Progressives had the excuse for voting against the Conservative amendment. "This time," said Mr. Meighen, "the people are going to find out whether the Progressive members are interested in office, or whether they are interested in the application of sound principles of government."

## A Bit of I. O. O. F. History

The Order was first introduced into Charlottetown by the institution of St. Lawrence Lodge No. 8. This Lodge was instituted on October 13th, 1869, with the following Charter Members: John P. Irving, James W. Falconer, William H. Barnard, Andrew E. Patrick, Wm. B. Allen. This Lodge met with success from the start, and is today the largest and most flourishing lodge in the Maritime Provinces. In 1877 six of its members withdrew for the purpose of organizing a lodge at Summerside, Prince Edward No. 22. These were W. W. Stumbles, Sylvanus Keith, T. L. Chappell, N. D. Stairs, P. H. Beer and J. A. McMourtry. After getting Prince Edward Lodge well started, these members returned to the old lodge. In 1876, Wilsey Lodge No. 27, was instituted in this city, the following being the charter members: E. H. Brennan, E. M. Estey, Benjamin Bremner, E. D. Stair, F. H. Beer, Arch. White, J. McKecknie. Wilsey has also been a very successful lodge and like St. Lawrence and Prince Edward is also one of the best and strongest lodges in the Province.

The lodges of the island have been honored in the Grand Lodge by the selection of five of their members to the office of Grand Master, the highest office within the gift of the Grand Lodge. These are Benjamin Bremner, T. B. Gray, T. L. Chappell, John P. Wheat, G. G.
