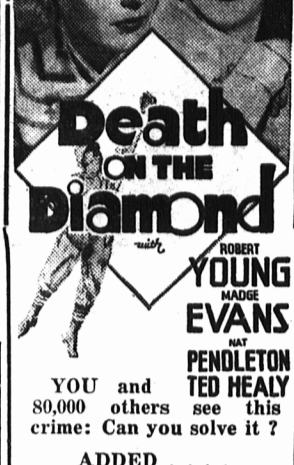

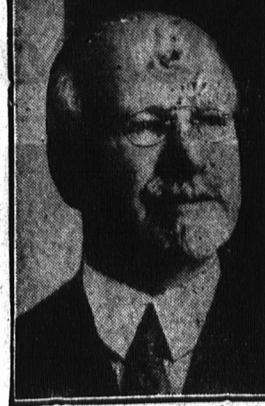

103RD ANNUAL STATEMENT AS
AT DECEMBER 31st, 1934

An unusually high percentage of cash and readily available assets and an increase of over \$7,000,000 in deposits feature the 1934 Annual Statement of The Bank of Nova Scotia, which is published today.

Deposits, which total \$215,153,834, an increase of 3.4 per cent. over last year, are now at the highest figure in the history of this century-old Bank; approximately \$5,000,000 of the increase is in interest-bearing deposits. Current coin, legal notes of other banks, United States and other foreign currencies, together with the deposit in the Central Gold Reserve, total \$34,111,869, which is 14 per cent. of total liabilities to the public compared with 15.65 per cent. last year. Readily available assets total \$164,227,541 which works out at 67.4 per cent. of liabilities to the public compared with 61 per cent. in 1933. These percentages indicate the unusually strong working capital position of the Bank, enabling it to give full assistance to industry and enterprise in any expansion of business that may occur.

Investments made up of Dominion and Provincial securities, Municipal securities, railway and other bonds and securities, all shown at not exceeding market value, total \$4,527,147, an increase of \$15,336,775. The increase is represented in Dominion and Provincial direct and guaranteed securities, investments in other bonds and securities showing a decrease of \$417,813.

Call loans in Canada and abroad totalling \$14,423,292 are compared with \$11,010,208 in 1933. Current loans in Canada of \$65,967,690 compare with \$67,117,492 last year—a decrease of \$1,120,792. Current loans elsewhere than in Canada at \$12,810,771 show a slight reduction of \$321,747. The total assets of the Bank are increased from \$270,316,783 to \$280,376,787, an all time year-end high.

Notwithstanding the difficult conditions which continue to prevail, the Bank has been able to maintain its earnings at a creditable level. Profits before making provision for Dominion and Provincial taxes of \$442,069 amount to \$1,850,330. This figure is not directly comparable with 1933 profits of \$2,035,900 for the reason that 1933 profits were reported before payment of Dominion Government tax on circulation of \$112,000, the change this year being made for the sake of uniformity in Bank Statements. It will thus be seen that the Bank's profits are a slight decline, i.e., \$173,570. Dividends to the amount of \$1,440,000 were paid. The Officers' Pension Fund was credited with \$115,000 while \$250,000 was written off Bank premises. The amount of undivided profits was increased on the year's operation from \$637,124 to \$682,445.

It is of interest to note that this is the 103rd Annual Statement of this fine old Bank, which has paid dividends uninterrupted since its incorporation in 1832.

SKELTON IN THE SANDPIT

KITCHENER, Ont., Jan. 21.—Months of intensive effort to identify the broken skeleton of a woman found in a sandpit failed to reveal grounds for the strange confession of a demented foreigner. Details of the case have been entered in the annals of Canada's unsolved mysteries.

Findings of the skeleton by children playing in the sand of Woodside Park in April, 1924, started a search through police files for an old letter from Jacob Ginnovitch, alias Jacob Tender, who claimed to have buried the body of a young woman in the park.

Ginnovitch, a former Austrian soldier, wrote the letter from Montreal while awaiting expected deportation to his native country in 1920. He was not deported but sent to a Canadian asylum for treatment.

Efforts to identify the woman were unsuccessful. Condition of the bones convinced experts they had been buried about the time Ginnovitch claimed the young woman accompanied him on the walk. But they gained no further clues.

ment. The "confession" was made in a series of letters to police and the Kitchener crown attorney.

Mental condition of the man, described by police as a "dope fiend" was believed responsible for the open admission, though he claimed it was made for "God's sake and to save my soul."

Disclosure of the bones in the sandpit four years later however led authorities to renew their efforts to have Ginnovitch tell a coherent story. In the asylum he promised to lead officers to the spot where he said he buried the girl's body after she died from an overdose of cocaine in September, 1925.

Interviewed by police he assumed an air of importance and directed details for his trip back to Kitchener where he said he met the girl, known to him only as "Mary," while she waited at the railway station for a train to take her to Detroit.

On his trip to Woodside Park he directed that he be accompanied by officers, a jury of eight men, and two clergymen. Police escorted to his wishes, and in the park led him to point out the spot where his alleged victim was buried.

"Now gentlemen," he said, turning to the group accompanying him, "I'm supposed to be insane. I've been insane for five years and this is to show you that I am insane."

But immediately his attitude changed. He became taciturn and moody. He wandered through the park and pointed to a spot from where the skeleton had been found. Police could gain no further information and the man returned to the asylum.
