LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Provincial Legislature, May 5th. The House met at 11.50 a. m. Hon. Mr. Lea moved, seconded by Hon. Mr. LePage the following resolution.

"That it is expedient to provide for a superannuation allowance for John Anderson, the present Provincial Auditor, and that a bill be introduced, embodying the said provision. The motion carried. A bill in accord with the resolution was read a first time.

A message was read from the secretary of the Minister of State, enclosing a minute of Council approving of the statutes at the Legislative session of 1929.

Second reading was giving to an Act to provide for the apportionment of the allowance in lieu of taxes on railway property.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Cox, the House went into committee with Mr. Mustard in the chair, on a resolution opposing the prohibition of spring shooting. The purpose of the resolution, which has been published in full in the press, was explained by the promoter. The resolution requests that the Migratory Birds' Act be amended to permit the spring shooting of wild geese in this Province between the twenty-fourth day of March, and the tenth day of April, and the fall shooting of wild geese between the first day of October and the fourteenth day of December in this Province, and the spring shooting of brant between the twenty-fourth day of May and the tenth day of June, and the fall shooting of brant between the first day of October and the fourteenth day of December in this Province and recommends that a committee of the House be named for the purpose of preparing a memorial to be presented to the House of Commons setting forth the facts embodied in the resolution.

The resolution was discussed with approval by Mr. Allen, Dr. McMillan, Mr. Sharp, Mr. Butler and Mr. Darby. The resolution was agreed to without amendment.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Wright, the House went into committee with Mr. Darby in the chair on the following resolution:

That the following petition be sent to His Excellency, the Governor General in Council: To His Excellency, the Governor General in Council:

We, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, The Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in General Assembly convened approach your Excellency and represent:—

That the Province of Prince Edward Island, being without forest and mineral resources, and practically without manufacturing industries, is dependent entirely on the success of Agriculture and Fishing, not only for its prosperity, but for its very existence.

That being situated so far from the manufacturing industries of Central Canada, Prince Edward Island is unable to compete with the farmers of the Central Provinces in supplying farm produce to these manufacturing centres, owing to the excessive cost of transportation.

That, owing to the above fact, the Province of Prince Edward Island is dependent on foreign markets for the sale of its farm produce.

That, the policy of the federal government at the present time, in building up trade barriers against foreign countries has had a tendency to close these markets against us.

That, the higher tariffs placed on imports of manufactured goods has resulted in higher prices to the farmer and the fisherman of the commodities which they require to purchase.

That at the present time the prices received for farm produce and fish are so excessively out of proportion to the cost of Agricultural Machinery, rope, and other manufactured goods, that it is impossible for either farmers or fishermen to carry on except at a heavy loss.

That if these conditions exist for any continued period of time, it will mean bankruptcy for the Province. With these considerations in view, we most respectfully and urgently press upon Your Excellency and Your Government the necessity of entering into negotiations with such foreign countries, particularly the United States and Cuba, whereby some reciprocal trade arrangement may be made; and further that the duties may be removed from Agricultural Machinery and rope, in order that the farmer and fisherman may be enabled to procure these implements of production at the lowest possible cost.

Therefore this Legislative Assembly prays that Your Excellency will take the foregoing facts into your most serious consideration, and that you would be pleased to adopt the course which the prosperity of this Province so urgently demands.
