Gyro Club Will Handle Sale Of Christmas Seals

The Charlottetown Gyro Club has entered into an arrangement with the Canadian Tuberculosis Association for the handling of the sale of Christmas Seals in Prince Edward Island. The proceeds will be used for anti-tuberculosis work.

The Club committee intends sending out letters containing a number of seals to the people of the Province generally, with the request that the seals be purchased for the sum of one dollar or more, if the recipient feels that he or she can give more to this great curative and preventive work. The extent of the givings will determine largely the scope of the work in the year 1932.

No elaboration is needed in order to convince the citizens of the Province that here is a worthy cause, worthily conducted. The thing now is for the people worthily to support it. There is every sign of real and intelligent appreciation on the part of the public to the value of prevention and early treatment of tuberculosis. The doctors tell us that this disease which until recently was classed as incurable or nearly so, may not only be cured but so prevented that in a matter of a generation it can, if the people co-operate, be to all intents and purposes stamped out. But the words of medical men are of little avail if not heeded. The encouraging aspect of the present situation in this Province is that attention is being given and well given to the matter. This must be continued and funds are necessarily required. In connection with the satisfactory work being done, therefore, it is well to remember the Christmas Seals. These provide much of the wherewithal to continue a great and winning cause.

SEALS ARE ATTRACTIVE The attractive appearance of the new Tuberculosis Christmas Seal is pleasing the committee in charge of the campaign for the sale and the members of the Club generally. The Seal bears the design of a jovial server, bearing aloft a steaming plum pudding. Red, green and yellow are the colors used, with a bright red border around the edge of the seal. All the materials used in connection with the Seal this year have been designed and printed in Canada.

EXECUTIVE MEETS - A meeting of the Executive of the Prince Edward Island Presbyterian Church in Kensington United Church on Wednesday at 10 a. m. Ten members were present. The President, Mrs. Hammond Toombs, led the devotional exercises. It was decided to hold the Presbyterian in Trinity United Church, Summerside, on Jan. 26th and 27th. Arrangements in detail were made for these meetings. Words of encouragement from different members were cheering and the financial statement for third quarter found in good standing. Mrs. Toombs read a letter from Miss Minnie M. Bell telling the need of warm clothing at some of our home stations. BRING CHEER TO OTHERS The year 1930 shows this Province holds the unenviable record of having the highest death rate from tuberculosis in Canada; hence the imperative need for increased effort in fighting the great white plague. In Prince Edward Island there is a splendid opportunity, if the situation is properly grasped, to bring about a great reduction in this appalling death rate. This, however, can only be accomplished by a united effort on the part of all. Your help is needed. Use lots of Christmas Tuberculosis Seals on all letters and parcels. Merchants should seal all their store parcels and deliveries with the double-barred cross seal, the emblem of the war on Tuberculosis.

HOME IMPROVED - Despite the economic depression and low prices for farm products this fall much activity can be seen on the premises of Alexander MacDonald, Blooming Point North. During the last two months Mr. MacDonald had a number of men improving his dwelling. The improvements are as follows: house raised two feet, three bay-windows, piazza over front door, vestibule over outside cellar hatch, basement deepened to nine feet and foundation of native stone and Portland cement. HELD FOR MURDER

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 20 - Charles Schwartz, 23, of Montreal, was arraigned in police court here today charged with the murder of John Jarvis nightwatchman of the Castle Building, who was fatally shot on September 19. Earlier in the day he was held criminally responsible for Jarvis' death by a coroner's jury. Preliminary enquete was set for November 26. Also held criminally responsible for Jarvis' death by the coroner's jury was Glosue Badetti, 37, who is being sought by the police on a warrant charging him with murder. The jury rendered its verdict without deliberating.

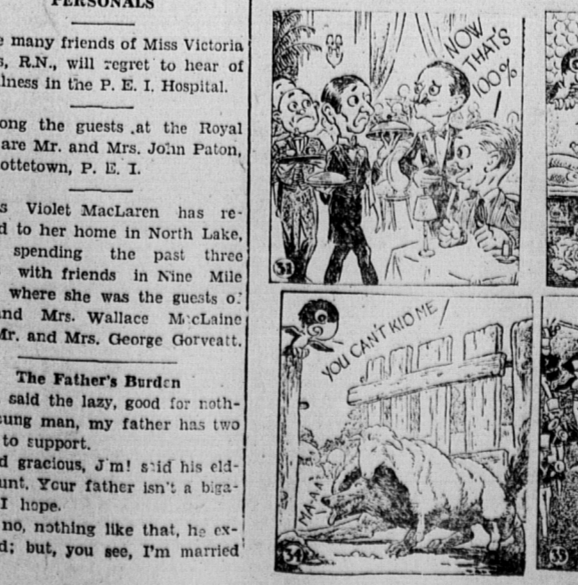
