National Council Of Women Meet

(Canadian Press.) SAINT JOHN, N.B., Oct. 4.—Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, of Saint John, is to have a place of special honor and prominence in the agenda of the annual meeting of the National Council of Women which will be held in Stratford, Ont., on Oct. 4 to 7. At the public meeting on the night of the opening day, Mrs. Smith who is vice-president for the province, will speak on "Geneva and its Environments" and later in the conference will present reports from the International Council of Women's Geneva session and the committee on suffrage and the rights of citizenship and for the committees on education.

Attention will be given to the recommendations sent down by the International Council. These recommendations include the following: That each council appoint a section for Letters and Arts and cooperate with national committees of international organizations; that a woman lawyer be placed on the committee of codification of international law to represent women's interests; that laws against traffickers be strengthened and their application be adequately grounded in biological science and their application to character training and social life; that measures be taken for the protection of persons without nationalities; that young people in general occupations be compelled to attend continuation schools and that continuation courses for agriculture and domestic science be established where they do not now exist; that the fullest co-operation be given the International Committee of Intellectual Co-operation, and that the suggestion on bus lines and circulation of obscene publications be strongly urged.

Resolutions to be brought forward by councils in Canada include those from British Columbia, that the National Council be resident in Western Canada, that the Trades and Employment for Women; that the convenor of laws be asked to make in a recommendation on bus lines for granting alimony; that the Dominion Government be asked to grant women the right to be appointed members of the Senate and the British North America Act, does not permit such appointment. Institution in himself,—his contentment must be properly celebrated.

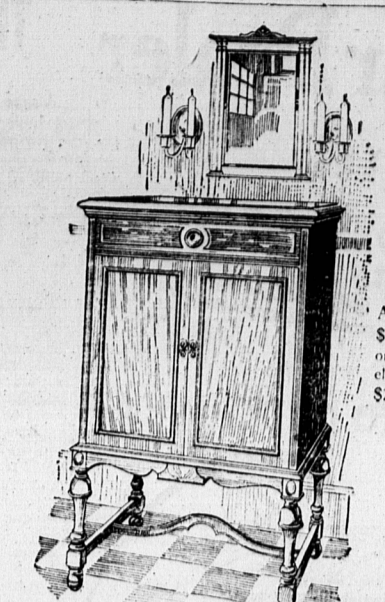
